

## From the Chair

I am confident that the transition will be a smooth one, since there are at least four potential new Committee members 'waiting in the wings'.

As I prepare the Chairman's report for the AGM I have been musing over the many highs and occasional lows of the past two years and I thought I might unpack a few of them here. First, I have been delighted at the way in which membership in the north of the city has grown and how the fledgling groups have flourished – there are now 15 of them with others in the pipeline. For example, it was a joy to explore Ecclesfield with the then new Local History Group and to hear how some of the members, brimming over with enthusiasm, had started their own research into the area.

I am equally pleased with the development of the monthly Drop-In Sessions, most of which have been a buzz of activity. They provide a place both for prospective members to be welcomed and for existing members to make new friends. Some Groups have met there to plan their programme; and University academics have been able to obtain support for their research projects. My thanks go to all the volunteers who have made coffee, washed up and made the new-comers feel at home.

I must also thank the Coordinators who allowed me to gate-crash on their Groups. My visits showed me how different the Groups can be - but they were all friendly, purposeful and run with effective but democratic leadership. I have met some delightfully modest and helpful people over the past four years, only discovering afterwards how eminent many have been in previous roles.

The other was to share the enthusiasm of the members who are tackling a neglected part of Whirlow Brook Park. As I write the first consignment of shrubs has arrived for the SU3A Memorial Garden. And the lows? Hardly any really. Certainly, I have felt frustrated that we have not so far been able to find sufficient affordable and accessible space for Group meetings, especially in or near to the city centre. I hope that we continue to make representations with central and local government. And, if I am honest, I have occasionally been saddened by the behaviour of a minority of members who act as though their subscription entitles them to avail themselves - and criticise - all that SU3A has to offer, without giving anything back. Fortunately the vast majority of us understand that SU3A needs to give as well as to take.

And so a very rewarding two years comes to an end. The final word must be to thank my fellow Committee members for their unfailing support and generosity. They have worked harder than is the norm because of all the preparations for Jubilee Year. It has been a privilege to work with them and I wish them well for the future.

### **The 'Centre Pages'**

The 'Centre Pages' show all the Groups active in SU3A. The number of pages in each Issue has now increased from four in 2009 to eight, reflecting the health of SU3A. As we publish 2,500 copies of *Links* each time these amount to 20,000 pages.

## **Could you Support Childrens' Reading in Primary School**

Since Spring 2009, SU3A volunteers have taken part in an initiative now called ESCAL (***Every Sheffield Child Articulate and Literate*** by the age of 11), to help primary school pupils needing to raise their level of reading attainment and to benefit fully from their approaching move to secondary school. The basic volunteer commitment is one hour per week for ten weeks, working one-to-one with two pupils for half an hour each.

2011 began with a total of 142 volunteers providing reading support in primary schools across the city. SU3A members currently represent more than 25% of this team and some have continued since their recruitment to the project in early 2009.

One-to-one support can achieve dramatic progress in pupils' reading skills and ESCAL development workers have come to count on, and very much value, the enthusiastic contribution of SU3A members. Demand for the help of volunteers throughout the city never declines, but there are gaps in coverage of schools in north and east Sheffield. Volunteers' choice of the areas where they would prefer to work is always a priority for ESCAL, but if you feel you could offer help to a school perhaps further from your home, this would be greatly appreciated. ## **Today's World Group**

### **Renewable Energy**

In today's world we can not escape the ongoing arguments and conflicting propaganda about global warming and climate change. To avoid future catastrophe, we are told it is essential that we reduce our energy consumption and develop alternative sources of energy, instead of exploiting fossil fuels. The answer, or at least a part of it, lies in the use of renewable energy sources. This was the latest topic for our Group discussion, introduced by Michael Miller. He was also able to demonstrate the application of one of the new technologies, as he enjoys the benefits of a number of solar panels installed on the roof of his house.

In contrast to the use of fossil fuels, the supply of which is finite, renewable energy, because it is provided by natural forces, is described as un-ending. That sounds good, like perpetual motion, but the problem is that to exploit forces such as the wind, sun or tides would require massive investment and have unwelcome social consequences. One staggering figure mentioned was that if we were to develop energy from bio-fuels, then 75% of the land in Britain would be needed - but it would only be enough to satisfy a quarter of our current energy consumption!

Discussing the problem showed us just how complex it is and that there are certainly no easy answers in the short term. Most people now agree that a mix of different sources of energy is needed in order to minimise the impact on our environment and over-reliance on one source.

It seems unlikely that we will ever achieve a state where renewables will satisfy all our energy needs. One of the sources will need to be from vast solar power facilities, in remote deserts, and an expansion of nuclear energy. The future for us may be bright, but it will not be lacking in controversy!

## **Visit to Blenheim Palace and Blaydon**

### **Thursday 21 July 2011**

Our June visit is a complete contrast from our April visit to the Black Country Museum. After a glimpse of the lives and work of ordinary people in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, we visit Blenheim Palace, the magnificent home of the Dukes of Marlborough and the birthplace of Winston Churchill.

It was presented to his ancestor John Churchill (Duke of Marlborough) by a grateful Queen and nation to commemorate his decisive victory against the French at Blindheim (Blenheim) in Bavaria in 1704, thereby halting any further European ambitions of King Louis XIV.

Designed by Vanbrugh, with grounds landscaped by Capability Brown and later water gardens created by Achille Duchene, it is now a designated World Heritage Site and one of the most sumptuous of all our stately homes.

We have also included a short visit to Blaydon, to view the grave of Winston Churchill.

The inclusive cost, for admission to the Palace and Gardens, travel and gratuity, is £28.00 per person (or £17.00 for members of the Historic Houses Association). Lunch is not included, but there is a good self-service café/restaurant overlooking the Water Terraces.
