From the Chair

It never fails to amaze me how quickly the year flies by and once again the leaves are falling, the nights are drawing in and winter is around the corner. The conference season was in full swing when I travelled to Nottingham where the National U3A AGM was held at the modern, swish, East Midlands Centre.

It was certainly a packed programme with four professors including Heinz Wolff, who is now Emeritus Professor of Bioengineering at Brunel University. Do you remember him? He always wears flamboyant bow ties, speaks with a pronounced foreign accent and appeared very often on our tellies in the 1960's and 70's. His lecture was entitled "Anybody Want to go to Mars?" and it was a humorous but highly factual thesis that told us the Martian day is twice as long as ours and that there are only two distinct seasons, summer and winter. He concluded that missions to Mars are practical and feasible from the Moon but the journey is only one way with no return ticket for the brave soul that will eventually take it on.

Also present was Baroness Estelle Morris who gave a very eloquent speech reiterating our mantra that we are all teachers, students and learners all our lives. We were told how important organisations like the U3A are because in this specialised age we seem to have lost the links to learning outside of educational institutions. She finished in a pensive mood admitting that "politics moves pieces; education changes lives."

I also went to two seminars: a meeting of the Yorkshire and the Humber Region and the AGM where Ian Searle, U3A's chairman, was voted in for a further year. Currently, there are 820 U3As with just over 272,000 members. Membership has increased by 22,000 (8.6%) since January 2011 and it is anticipated to grow to 300,000 during 2012 and to 500,000 by 2020. Because of demography and the changing of retirement ages, the male/female ratio is likely to change over the next 10 years from 37/63 to 45/55 making it much more evenly balanced than it is at present.

Another keynote speech was that of Eric Midwinter. Eric had, along

with Michael Young and Peter Lazlett, founded the U3A nearly thirty years ago and he had seen it grow from a germ of an idea to the successful organisation it is today. Some of his more memorable observations I have listed below.

- Old age or later life should be a long, beautifully written, last paragraph not a hastily scribbled note.
- Every U3A is different from other U3As and every U3A is the same as other U3As.
- I am an older person not a social casualty and I am forming my own destiny.
- U3A is very good for people for whom U3A is very good.

It was a witty, articulate presentation and I am pleased to say that we have managed to secure Eric to speak on comedy - especially the genius of those two British institutions, Morecambe and Wise - at The Showroom Cinema in April 2012.

One of my most embarrassing moments this year happened at The Showroom. I am sure some of you remember a lecture on the History of Linguistics back in January. People were piling into the auditorium and they kept on coming and coming. Every seat was taken and members were still queuing outside to get in. We asked the management for the bigger cinema but it was in use as they had put on an extra showing of The King's Speech owing to its popularity. Well, we are in the process of engaging Professor Andrew Linn again, along with the bigger cinema, so this time you should all get in. Remember these lectures are free and open to everyone. We have some excellent speakers lined up for 2012 on topics from *A History of the Fairground* to *The Spanish Civil War* so please look in *LINKS* or on the website so you do not miss out. (Keep your eye on September – it may surprise you!!)

We have had many requests to have events on Saturdays and Sundays so "Weekenders" is another new, open Group beginning in January. There will be a dedicated page in *LINKS* and online to keep you informed about what is coming up. Also new next year are two special study days. The first is in February at the Weston Park Museum on China and the second in April at the Millennium Galleries. This will be on "Art and the Family" presented by Barbara Morden in conjunction with the concurrent art exhibition.

Finally, during that brief but magical "Indian summer" we had in late September, I visited Whirlow Brook Park for the Commemorative Garden's open day. The plot by the pond is looking wonderful with much under-planting of bulbs such as hellebores, snowdrops, crocus and cyclamen along with primroses, so it should be quite a sight in the spring. The Lord Mayor of Sheffield, Sylvia Dunkley, came and admired all the hard work the gardening Group had done. She admitted to having a soft spot for this park as she visited it often when her children were small and confessed to their having made dens in the bushes and trees. One of our members, Mary Mac, a talented artist, gave the Lord Mayor a picture she had painted of the lily pond in its heyday to commemorate the visit. Mary has also kindly donated another of her colourful artworks to raffle for funds for the Group. Tickets for this raffle can be purchased at most of our open venues.

The next LINKS to land on your doormat will be early in 2012. So, may I thank you all for your support in what has been a splendid and successful Jubilee year, and may I wish you all the warmest of Season's Greetings and good health and happiness for the year ahead.

Jesus/Christianity Today

At a SU3A Drop-In some months ago I found several members who expressed interest in having a Group to look at the present post-Christian world and ask if there are new ways in which we might salvage what was good about Jesus, or find new insights from the Gospels.

"Sustainable Development? What do they do? It does not sound much fun."

Well, judge for yourself from what we have been doing lately.

In October we went to Ryton Gardens, the home of the charity Garden Organic, which has been extolling the benefits of gardening by feeding the soil naturally year after year rather than giving plants a quick chemical fix since the days when it was the height of eccentricity.

Alongside the expected displays of composting and related activities we found the less predictable, such as a garden visualising the ideas behind biodynamic horticulture, which take organic principles a stage further, and an indoor 'Vegetable Kingdom' exhibition area for younger visitors in particular. This was a vivid way of illustrating why vegetables are important to our diet and even what they look like growing in the ground (knowledge that can no longer be taken for granted). The Gardens gave us a pleasant day out in a beautiful setting, with or without the organic messages.

A week or so later we were in the very different setting of Sheffield's Energy Recovery Facility (a.k.a Bernard Road incinerator) seeing how the 'rubbish' from our wheelie bins goes into the National Grid rather than a hole in the ground. We were impressed by the way nothing is wasted if it can possibly be avoided. Heat from burning the rubbish, for example, creates steam to generate electricity; then the steam is condensed back to

water and used again. Metal in the ash is reclaimed for scrap (which could quite possibly be recycled in a car) and the ash itself goes into aggregate (which could become the road the car drives on).

Only the dust filtered from the flue gases fails to find a useful job and is sent for safe disposal. If you have to incinerate - and the current wisdom is that sometimes it is the best way — Sheffield is apparently doing it better than most.

We rounded off our tour by climbing aboard a refuse collection vehicle (OK, bin lorry – even the professionals call it that) and did we mention we had lunch beforehand? In fact we nearly always have lunch – and tea too, if we can manage it. More fun than you thought, you see. Why not join us and find that out for yourself?

The Scottish Highlands Holiday in September

The tail-end of a Caribbean hurricane was forecast to interfere with our trip to Scotland so we drove North looking over our shoulders. In the event, we had some rain most days but were told Sheffield suffered more!

The Cairngorms were stunning. Even in the gloom of rain clouds marching overhead their majesty was unforgettable. These mountains are Cambrian and Devonian in origin, formed from ancient granites. Having left Sheffield at sevenish we arrived at our destination in the Spey valley about 5.30 p.m. The Nethybridge Hotel has an ancient 3-passenger cage lift serving three floors each with a gate. If a gate on any floor is not securely closed the mechanism refuses to move and travellers have to call for someone on another floor to check the doors. (A contretemps with the lift lead me one morning to suffer the ignominy of arriving late for the departure of the bus ... the shame of it).

The program was full of interest. Our first day included a visit to the Highland Folk Museum in Newtownmuir. The Folk Museum included a recreation of a 1700 township with turf houses roofed with heather and open peat fires but no chimneys only a hole in the roof. There were spaces for cattle in some of the crofts. Another recreation was a 1930's croft with animals and farm machinery and a 1930's tin-walled school. Whenever I visit such places I am slightly uneasy that my personal recollections are not so very different when it comes to desks and slates and inkwells and maps of Empire ... but then a U3A Group may well be a piece of living history to be visited one day soon.

a Ranger step-son of Margaret Bullivant, who urged her to organise this trip) gave some of us lifts to the more distant parts of the Folk Museum (for which our gratitude).

A visit to the 16th century Ballindalloch Castle in the afternoon was a striking contrast to the crofters' village. The Lairds of Ballindalloch, the Macpherson-Grants, have lived in the castle

On Tuesday we had an hour's drive to the Rangers Base where we were met again by Nic Bullivant. He gave an illustrated talk about the Cairngorms and the work of the Rangers who are crucial to environmental protection and to the safety of the thousands of visitors to the National Park. The Cairngorms funicular railway allowed us to ride to the centre near the summit of the mountain. Walking outside around the centre was discouraged due to wind and rain but there were well placed viewing platforms and the views across the mountains were splendid. Our return included, for the more intrepid among us, a walk through the rain to Glenmore Forest Park on the shores of Loch Morlich.

A quick ride to the Caledonian Canal and on into Loch Ness gave us a boat trip to Drumnadrochit, a three hour round trip, time to ponder the order of things and the fate of small people against the canvas of large events.

The final day dawned bright for our visit to the Highland Wildlife Park. One of the Education Officers boarded our coach at the entrance and gave us a commentary about the Park which specializes in Scotland's native species and endangered species from elsewhere in the tundra regions. The Lynx were exciting as were the Amur tigers. For once we were blessed with warm sunshine and could walk about the pedestrian section of the reserve in comfort and sit outside to eat lunch watching the monkeys having theirs.

Our last visit was to Dalwhinnie Distillery. In years past cattle drovers from the West and North would met here (Dalwhinnie in Gaelic means "the meeting place"). I think the unfamiliar benediction of the Sun is the only explanation for two bottles of the gentle spirit of the glen being found in our luggage on the last night.

Royal Air Force Museum Cosford and Moseley Old Hall, Wolverhampton

Wednesday 21 March 2012

Set in scenic Shropshire, the Royal Air Force Museum invites visitors to explore the history of the RAF from its beginnings up to its present day role. There are displays of over 70 aircraft ranging from the earliest Spitfire and other wartime planes, including Allied and enemy ones, up to the modern missile and air transport machines. There is also a special display on the significant part played by the RAF during the Cold War. You will also be able to have fun with various "hands on" activities.

In short there is plenty for everyone to enjoy.

We will have lunch in the Refuel Restaurant. It will be a 2-course meal of Steak and Ale Pie, Rhubarb Crumble and Tea or Coffee. The vegetarian option is Vegetable Lasagne. Please tick your choice on the booking slip on page 27.

Lancaster

17 - 21 September 2012

The short break in September next year will be based in Lancaster on the River Lune and near to seaside resorts and the southern Lake District.

We will break our journey from Sheffield with a visit to Rufford Old Hall, near Ormskirk. This is one of Lancashire's finest Tudor buildings where a young William Shakespeare once performed for Sir Thomas Hesketh and his guests. The Hall has a fine collection of furniture, tapestries, arms and armour. There is a woodland walk by the canal and topiary and sculpture in the gardens.

The Hall is a National Trust property so entry is free to NT card holders and non-members will pay £6.30 on the day.

On our second day we will have a Blue Badge Guide for a tour of the City, by coach and on foot. In the afternoon we will take tea in Morecambe at the splendidly refurbished Art Deco Midland Hotel with its stylish Eric Gill art work.

Day three takes us to "Blackwell" - the most important and the largest surviving early example of work by the architect Mackay Hugh Bailey Scott. This 1890's Arts and Crafts House has fine examples of the decorative arts of the period. After lunch we take the boat from Bowness across Windermere to Lakeside for a visit to Stott Park Bobbin Mill - built in 1835 to produce the wooden bobbins vital to the Lancashire spinning and weaving industries.

On the penultimate day of this holiday we may have a "Brief Encounter" at Carnforth Station, followed by a visit to Leighton Hall - home of the famous furniture-making Gillow dynasty. After our early evening meal a coach will take us to see the famous Blackpool Illuminations.

On our homeward journey we will visit the Queen Street Mill Textile Museum near Burnley. This is the world's last nineteenth century steam-powered weaving mill and is highly commended by the Association for Industrial Archaeology. *Continued on page 26...*

Yow will praps be supprised that I should maik soa bolde as tow rite to yow who is sutch a ladi and I hop that yow will not bee vex at mee for it. I hardly dare say wat I want I ham so timid about ladis and mi and trimmels like a lespin lefe. I am a farmar in a small wai and mi age is rayther more than 40 year and mi mother lives with me and keeps mi ouse and shee as been very pourley laitly and cannot stur about mutch and I think I shud be comfurtable with a wife. I have had mi I on yow a long time and I think that yow are a very nice young wumman and one that wud make me appi if only yow think soa. We ave a nice parlor down stares with a blu carpet and a huven on one side of the fire plaice and the old woman on the uther smoaking. The golden 'rules claimed up on the walls abuv the long settle and yow cud sit awl the day in the ezy chare and nit and mend my kirtles and leggings and yow cud maik the tee reddy again I cum in.

So I hop to hear from yow as I am in desprit and yurnist and will marrie yow at mai day or if my mother dees afore Ise want yow afore if only yow will except of mi.
