Minutes of the 27th Annual General Meeting held on 18 April 2013 at the Central United Reformed Church, Sheffield

Present: around 59 members, with Denise West in the chair.

1. Minutes of the 26th AGM

The Minutes of the AGM held on 18 April 2012 (previously circulated) were agreed as a correct record. Proposed: Alan Wisbey, seconded: Steffon West.

2. Chairman's Annual Report

2.1 The Annual Report had appeared in the April *Links*.

There were currently 2894 members in Sheffield U3A, 186 activity groups, and 7 open groups. Sheffield U3A was once again the largest U3A in the country. The annual subscription would remain at £10.00.

- 2.2 The Development Plan for 2013/14 was on the SU3A website.
- 2.3 Communication with Members

Running a large organisation was difficult and ways were always being sought to improve communication with members.

- 2.3.1 The most popular method of communication was via the bi-monthly publication, *Links*. Efforts were continually made to give as much notice as possible about forthcoming events and activities. Changes had been made to the format of *Links*, making it more eye-catching and the printing more easy to read, which had received favourable comments. Distribution would in future be undertaken by a newly appointed printing company, who would label, stuff and deliver to Sheffield Hallam for franking and posting. Denise West thanked the few selfless volunteers who had worked tirelessly behind the scenes for many years and for which they were heartily thanked.
- 2.3.2 The website was designed to not only attract new members but also to give more up-to-date information than could be achieved via *Links*.

The homepage was simple to understand and also had links to other areas of information. The number of hits was, on average, 224 a week.

There was now the facility to inform members on matters of urgency via email. Over 72% of members had email addresses and there was a 'buddy' system for members who were not online. The Membership Records Officer could now let members have their new membership number via email, which was a saving in time and postage.

- 2.3.3 The monthly Drop-Ins continued to evolve. There was now a meeter/greeter to welcome prospective members and introduce them to someone who could inform them about SU3A. It was still a venue for meeting up with friends over a cup of tea but also for holding small meetings for, for example, members on waiting lists.
- There were now 3 new members' meetings per year, which continued to have a high level of input from the Executive Committee. At these meetings great emphasis is on volunteering for tasks within SU3A and it has been heartening that so many new members have 'signed up' to help.
- 2.3.5 There would continue to be 2 Coordinators' meetings per year, with the spring meeting being general and the autumn meeting being for new Coordinators. This would continue to be an opportunity for networking and exchanging knowledge/experiences. Efforts would continue to be made to improve the content of these meetings.
- Publicity continued to be an essential part of raising public awareness. Information was already available in libraries and it was intended to target supermarkets, dentists and community noticeboards in the future. SU3A had participated in 10 pre-retirement talks over the past year and Meersbrook and Heeley had been targeted for outreach work. A promotional DVD on SU3A activities had been produced, which had proved a very useful tool. It was intended to use the press and local media more during the coming year.
- New openings with inter-generational work continued to be sought as it helped to break down barriers and pre-conceived ideas.
- Collaboration with the two Sheffield universities continued, resulting in the very successful lecture series and with SU3A members volunteering to help with various research projects.
- 2.3.9 The postage for Third Age Matters magazine had increased. However, the EC would continue to fund the difference of around £735 a year for members who wish to receive the magazine.

- 2.4 Denise West would take up the post of External Liaison Officer for one year. This role was to represent SU3A with outside bodies across Sheffield but is not a trustee post.

The Chair thanked her fellow EC members with whom she had worked for the past 4 years. Thanks to Pat Battams, Dave Caborn and Richard Morton. Particular thanks went to Clare Chiba, Web Coordinator, for her 5+ years of dedication and commitment.

Finally, thanks to Steffon West for all his support during the Chair's term of office.

Proposed: Margaret Bullivant, seconded Shirley Marney and accepted by the meeting.

3. Treasurer's Report

The treasurer made a number of comments on the accounts that had been sent to all members via *Links*.

Whilst membership and subscription income had increased when compared with 2011, gift aid income had fallen. This, he explained, was due to the ending of the transitional relief on gift aid.

The expenditure of £1074.00 on upgrading the membership secretary's systems had already been recovered by a saving in postage costs.

A late invoice for £744.00 in respect of printing the October edition of *Links* had not been included in the accounts. The treasurer apologised for this.

The 2013 budget for *Links* had been prepared when the costs of the new colour *Links* and of the printers arranging for the dispatch of *Links* were unknown. It now appeared that this budget was likely to be overgenerous.

At several recent AGMs concern had been expressed about the possibility of the government ending gift aid and the effect it would have on Sheffield U3A. The Treasurer pointed out that the Executive Committee's policy was to retain a reserve equivalent to 6 months' expenditure, in line with Third Age Trust guidelines, and a further reserve of £5,000 for emergencies. The short-term effects of any withdrawal would be met from these sources. In the long-term subscriptions would then have to rise by £2.00 to £12.00. Subscriptions at neighbouring U3As were currently from £12.00 to £30.00.

The treasurer asked for questions – none were forthcoming.

Before asking for a proposer and seconder for the adoption of the accounts the Treasurer pointed out that they had been examined by an independent examiner not yet elected by the members.

4. Election of Independent Examiner of Accounts

It was proposed to appoint Bob Mellers as the independent examiner of accounts. Proposed by John Lees, seconded by Barbara Robertshaw and accepted by the meeting.

5. Elections to the Committee

There were two nominations and two vacancies to fill. The nominees introduced themselves and gave details of their careers and interests:

John Evans Voted in unanimously by the meeting

Tricia Pulfrey Voted in unanimously by the meeting

The meeting was asked to vote in the continuing members of the Executive Committee *en bloc*. This motion was agreed and carried by a majority vote.

It was pointed out that 2 more committee members were required: web coordinator and general member. A deputy *Links* editor was also sought.

6. Any other business

No matters had been formally notified in advance and no matters were brought up at the meeting. The meeting closed at 11.30 with thanks from the chair for members' attendance.

Annual Report Sheffield U3A 2013-2014

Sheffield U3A is in a healthy state both financially and with membership numbers. This year we reached a total of 3043. Our 3000th member was recruited in October and he was given a certificate to commemorate the event. Annual re-enrolment is in progress at present but we still remain the largest group in the UK. We have 189 interest Groups and 7 open Groups. The Groups change throughout the year as some close but others form to keep the numbers relatively stable. It was decided to keep the membership fee at £10.00 for another year as this was enough to keep financially sound.

The Executive Committee members worked hard all year to continue the efficient running of the organisation but managed to enjoy themselves whilst doing so. All the officers must be thanked for their tireless support of the Group.

We were rewarded at the January meeting with a visit from the National Chairman who joined us for the meeting and our annual lunch. She appeared to be impressed with the way business was conducted and how the large numbers were catered for. The job descriptions of the trustees were revised this year and brought up to date. Whilst doing so, it was realised that some of the jobs had grown to almost unmanageable proportions and that when the time came to replace the current post holders it would be difficult.

Meetings are planned to assess the larger jobs and to discuss how to split the roles into smaller parts which will enable the work to be done by teams rather than individuals. There will still be a spokesperson reporting back to the Executive Committee.

We continue to forge close links with both universities in the city and this has been helped by the new post of External Relations Officer. We have also been approached during the year by two large national organisations to help them with future projects. We met with them, discussed what they had in mind and agreed to help in the future once funding had been obtained. These were both social schemes in the city of Sheffield where it was felt that the expertise and maturity of our members would bring assistance to the plans.

We publicise the group in the local newspapers and in the national magazine when possible but find that our most successful tools for obtaining new members are pre-retirement courses and word of mouth from happy and contented members.

The monthly Drop-In sessions go from strength to strength. Members seem to be using the opportunity to network with each other. New Groups have been formed and we still get members of the public coming along to find out about us. We usually have one or two postgraduate students recruiting volunteers for their research, mainly on topics to do with the ageing process. We continue to encourage shared projects with them.

We held three new members meetings this year and received very positive feedback from our newer members. At the meetings we try to stress our open approach and tell them how to find out what is going on within the organisation and how to suggest new ideas.

The website has been revised and updated and is now very exciting to use. It is the most current and topical way of spreading news. It is used both by members for information about Groups and events but also seems to attract browsers who are new to the city and are looking to find out what is happening. We are constantly looking at new and improved ways of contacting the majority of our members quickly, such as occasions where bad weather conditions force activities to be cancelled. This is improving but luckily it has not had to be used much.

The magazine *Links* has been much improved this year and the editorial team have to be congratulated on an excellent product. It is full of information and notices but despite the best efforts of the Editor is only as good as the information submitted. There have been some very good articles contributed and the colour photographs have made it so much more inviting to read. Although the Editor is never completely happy with the finished result and could always tweak it more, production has to be kept to a very strict schedule so your cooperation is appreciated when submitting copy. Well-deserved, positive feedback has been received from the membership.

As reported earlier, there have been some Groups which have been forced to close this year but we have kept the numbers up by new and exciting Groups starting. We try to keep waiting lists down by starting a new Group when sufficient numbers make it a viable prospect. Thank you to the General Coordinator for supervising this.

The Executive Committee members serve for a set number of years and we are looking to replace the current General Coordinator post-holder who must be congratulated for the work that he has put in over the years.

We need, and are looking for, fresh new members of the team in order to keep up the standards that have been set.

A very successful lunch meeting was held for all Group Coordinators, both as a way of thanking them for their work, but also as a chance for them to get together and air their views. It was declared a success and another one is planned for spring 2014.

A smaller meeting is planned for the autumn to enable new Coordinators to get together.

The open Groups continue to amaze with the varied programmes they offer from outings to lectures to lunches. The monthly lecture series has offered a variety of excellent speakers on diverse topics and more are planned for this year.

There were courses, concerts and much, much more to tempt members. The trips and holidays gave a wide range of experiences for our members to try and thanks are offered to ALL the Groups and ALL the teams who run them. SU3A is lucky to have you.

The intergenerational scheme ESCAL, working in schools, still continues and offers a brilliant service. Involvement continues with the universities both in research projects and shared learning opportunities like the Passages Theatre Group. More are planned for the future. The Gardening Group worked with Sheffield City Council Parks and Gardens Dept. at Whirlowbrook Park, which has been renovated to look fantastic. The Group has also begun to operate a 'flying gardeners' Group where they clean and tidy up bits of the city which need attention (see page 5).

We continued to work with YAHR (*Yorkshire and the Humber Region*) this year and attended meetings and events such as the Askham Bryan Open Day.

Also we were happy to participate in the first Northern Summer School. This was very successful and YAHR are to be congratulated.

It has been another fulfilling year for Sheffield U3A. There are more members enjoying more Groups on a regular basis. There are many opportunities to socialise whilst learning new things and visiting new places. However, we do not sit back, we are always looking for more chances to improve and widen the scope of our activities.

Thanks to everyone who works to make the organisation successful, from making tea, offering lifts, planning and organising to simply being there to help. You make SU3A what it is.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Members of The Sheffield University of the Third Age

I have reviewed the income and expenditure accounts for the year ended 31 December 2013 and the balance sheet as at that date and report as follows:

Respective Responsibilities of the Executive Committee and the Examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993) (*the Act*) and that an independent examination is needed.

SU3A Memory Course For Older People

seats around from which you may enjoy the blooms and their fragrances as well as the sculptures of Mrs Pat Austin.

On arrival at the garden, north of Wolverhampton, we will have coffee before enjoying a conducted tour of the rose gardens. A two-course lunch has been arranged for us in the restaurant after which there will be time to browse around the shop or perhaps buy a rose.

At 14.00 we leave for the short journey to

Weston Park for a conducted tour of the stately home. It was designed and built in the late 17th century and thereafter became the home of the Earls of Bradford. In the house there are fine tapestries and porcelain. The front hall reflects the third Earl's preoccupation with horses and the dining room displays an impressive collection of paintings by a range of artists including Van Dyck. Inevitably, Capability Brown left his mark in the gardens in the 18th century, but also of interest are the Italian Garden, the Victorian Orangery and the formal terraces. Before leaving at 16.30 there will be time to visit the café or the coffee bar and the gift shop.

The cost for the day is £35.00 per person. This includes coach travel, gratuities, coffee on arrival, a two-course lunch and guided tours at both venues.

Travel Group Visit to Three Churches

Monday 21 July 2014

The churches to be visited are: St. Mary and St. Hardulph, Breedon-on-the Hill, St. Wystan, Repton and St Michael with St. Mary, Melbourne.

These three churches offer almost too much for those interested in the history of the church and its architecture from the time of the Anglo-Saxons to the present day. We leave Ecclesall at 08.30 and the Interchange at 08.45 to travel into Leicestershire.

Having met our guide Pat McLaughlin for coffee at Breedon-on-the-Hill we will begin at the church of St. Mary and St. Hardulph, a notable landmark standing on the summit of a limestone knoll once the site of an Iron Age Fort and Saxon Abbey dedicated to St. Hardulph, a 7th century saint about whom little is known. This was a monastic church dating from the 7th century but the church as it is now dates from the 13th century with 15th century additions. Only the carvings date from the 7th century. An elaborate box pew attests to the dominance of the Shirley family in the 17th century.

We leave Leicestershire for Derbyshire and Repton where the good ladies of the parish will provide us with lunch.

We will then visit the Norman church of St. Wystan although the earliest church dates from the 7th century when it housed the first bishop of Mercia. The crypt is considered one of the finest survivals of Anglo-Saxon architecture.

Replete and informed we intend to conclude our visit at the fine Norman church at Melbourne. With its massive rounded pillars, elaborately decorated and carved, the church might have indeed offered respite to the bishop of Carlisle as he sought to escape the rapacious Scots in the 12th century.

The cost of this day is £25.00 per person. This covers travel, donations to the three churches, gratuity for the driver and payment to our guide, as well as coffee and lunch.
