From the Chairman

Your Executive Committee starts the 2008/09 year with high hopes of further gradual development of members' interests. Nothing stands still and we would be failing in our duty to maintain the present success of Sheffield U3A if we did not also look to the future.

Whilst losing two stalwart Committee members, Barbara Steel and Shirley Marney; we are fortunate to be joined by Clare Chiba, already the Web Coordinator; Vera Dyer, our new Secretary and Ken Stringfellow, well known in Walking Group circles. Shelagh Woolliscroft replaces David Rance as Vice-Chairman, the latter having been elected Vice-Chairman, Ridings Region. The rest of Committee news will be found elsewhere in this issue.

An item of general interest is the proposal from Mike Long, the Third Age Trust National Education and Development Officer, for a meeting for "very large U3As" (i.e. over 1,000 members). Mike suggests that "it might well be that in five years time we may have more than 50 U3As with more than 1,000 members......"

With 1,000 members regarded as "very large", then SU3A is already gigantic. If there is sufficient interest, the proposed meeting is intended to have two purposes – to provide an opportunity for discussion on issues particular to large U3As and, perhaps more significantly, "to provide the wider U3A community with the experience and expertise gained in managing a large U3A".

Finally, you will be aware that it is Sheffield U3A policy to support requests from one or other of the two Universities for volunteers to assist in research programmes related to older people. These are advertised from time to time after corroboration of their academic status. Those of you who were at the 2007 AGM may remember the leaflets and poster about a research study investigating the regions of the brain that control speaking. We were especially pleased recently to receive the following letter from Barbara Rosario (*my emphasis*) -

Cover Picture: Botanical Gardens - a "novel" idea? (see page 20)

"Previously you were kind enough to inform U3A members about our research project. I would be grateful if you would consider printing a thank you from the research group as we have secured funding of £72,000 based on the initial pilot data and will be purchasing an item of equipment called a brainsite and, possibly, a new transcranial magnetic stimulator as a result. We have been very grateful to the members that have taken part and still have a few members who we will contact again once the new equipment has been received. Many thanks."

Sheffield U3A News Update

Executive Committee Report

The last meeting of the Committee was held on 2 May. The first part of the meeting was devoted to the election of Officers for 2008/9. The full membership of the new Executive Committee is listed on the inside cover of this issue of *Links*. The Committee were pleased to note that Ann Barclay was to become Minute Secretary and Doreen Bezant (Joint General Coordinator) was co-opted onto the Committee.

Barbara Steel was also co-opted for two further meetings to assist in the handover to her successor. At the end of the meeting she was warmly congratulated for her many years of invaluable service to SU3A, both in her previous capacity as General Coordinator and her most recent role as Secretary for the last four years. Tribute was also paid to Shirley Marney for her sterling contribution to Committee affairs. The Committee were reassured that Barbara will remain actively involved in other ways for a long time to come and

we are fortunate that Shirley will continue as Travel Group Coordinator.

David Rance stepped down as Vice-Chairman to allow him to devote more time to his new role as recently elected Vice-Chairman of the Ridings Region Committee of U3A. The Ridings Region allows all of the 23 U3A's in Yorkshire to engage in the promotion and sharing of activities, initiatives and events across the Region. The most significant shared event last year was the open day at Askham Bryan. He was thanked and congratulated by Joan on behalf of all members. Shelagh Woolliscoft was elected to replace him and John Lees was elected as his replacement on the Ridings Region Committee. John Richards was also retiring from Ridings Region activities and the Committee will be writing to him to express our thanks for his ten years of service in various capacities across the Region.

It was agreed that a small ad-hoc group be chaired by David Pierce to prepare a response to the consultation document on Informal Adult Learning issued by the Department of Innovation, Universities and Skills. It seems that the Government may at last have realised the importance of this area and it is vital that we take this opportunity to set out our views.

The Committee had received three items of correspondence linked to the use of Gift Aid funding. It was noted that most of the points raised had been fully covered and explained in previous issues of *Links*. The points were taken into consideration later in the meeting when further allocations were considered.

Editorial Note

Should you wish items posted to me (pictures, CDs etc.) to be returned, please enclose a stamped addressed envelope with the correct postage. Typed / hand-written contributions are equally welcomed.

The Joint General Coordinators reported that we now had 150 Groups, four of which were open to all members. Brian Bezant was pleased to report that all Group Coordinators had now returned their Green Forms, but that 16 Coordinators had yet to return their Orange Forms, recording details of the members of their Group – *you know who you are!*

It was agreed that details of which Groups currently had waiting lists (only 13 at present) and which were seeking additional members (92 at present) would be published on our website. Brian tabled some other interesting statistics gleaned from the Green Forms -

- 40 Groups now have their own home page on the SU3A website
- 43 Groups meet in private homes
- 29 Groups meet in rented venues (sports clubs, halls etc)
- 24 Groups meet in free public accommodation (pubs, libraries etc)

Clare Chiba, our Web Coordinator, outlined recent changes to our website to give it a more modern look. She would welcome comments on the new design and suggestions from members on how the website could be further improved.

Peter Barclay, Publicity Coordinator, briefed the Committee on recent activities and proposals for a competition in which members would be asked to design some new SU3A posters for display across the city. It was agreed that a new publicity banner should be purchased for use when participating in outdoor events.

Roy Darlison attended to present a report from the Gift Aid Working Party. He indicated that another University linked lecture was being considered, but at an alternative venue in or near the city centre. In response to the comments recently received it was noted that the Working Party would be thoroughly evaluating the allocations approved from the funding available. A further three applications were approved and three were rejected. It was agreed that no further approvals for the purchase of GPS equipment for use by Walking Groups would be authorised until the use of the three

The next Committee meeting will be held on 4 July 2008.

Sheffield U3A Boundary Change

At the Executive Committee meeting on 29 February 2008, it was decided to replace the old "S" postcode boundary for membership of SU3A, with a new boundary defined by a circle of 15 miles radius centred on Sheffield Town Hall. The revised area includes most of the Hope Valley and the towns of Bakewell, Rotherham and Barnsley. The new boundary takes effect immediately.

It is known that there have been some difficulties recently, with applicants wishing to join SU3A Groups, but being disqualified from doing so because they lived outside the SU3A postcode area. It is anticipated that the new boundary should overcome those problems. If you know of anyone who has been refused membership on these grounds, please inform them that they may now re-apply.

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE FOR EVERY MEMBER

U3A Insurance Cover

It has recently been brought to the attention of the Sheffield U3A Executive Committee that some Groups have been allowing non-SU3A members to join their Group activities. This practice runs counter to the requirements of the U3A nationally arranged insurance policy for members, and has serious consequences for individual members' insurance cover.

Visitors **are** permitted to join in a SU3A activity, but **only** on the following basis -

- 1. A friend or relative of a member, joining a Group activity on an ad hoc / occasional basis.
- 2. A grandchild of a member joining, for example, a walk or a field trip, on an ad hoc / occasional basis.
- 3. A prospective SU3A member, sampling a Group activity, on no more than two occasions, to decide whether or not they wish to join SU3A and the Group.

In all cases, it is important that your Group Coordinator is kept fully informed of visitors' names and dates of attendance, so that he/she can keep a suitable record.

You should especially note that if these conditions are exceeded in your Group, then **all** the Group's members lose vital aspects of their insurance cover. It is, therefore, in your own interest to ensure that visitors are not permitted to outstay their welcome.

Your Group Coordinators have been informed of the above visitor conditions, and the consequences to your individual insurance cover if the conditions are exceeded. They will be able to explain these to you on request.

Gift Aid Report

The first round of Gift Aid awards was agreed at the Executive Committee meeting on 29 February 2008. Seventeen applications or preliminary enquiries had been received and ten grants were agreed, totalling approximately £1250 (see below).

The framework of decisions developed by the Working Group advising the Committee is as follows -

What does it add to the activities of the Group?
How many people will benefit?
Is it for capital or revenue?
Does it have updating or upgrading implications?
How much use will it get?
How long will it last?
Is there a training implication?
How will that be resourced?
How will capital items be kept and cared for?
How much money is sought?
Does it represent value for money?

The framework was further developed by discussion and it was agreed that no bid less than £5 would even "appear on the radar". It was emphasised that all items purchased would remain the property of Sheffield U3A. Several Global Positioning Systems were agreed for walking groups, but the point was made that support was contingent on training for users and real need.

It was agreed that a rolling programme would be entered into geared to the dates of future Executive Committee meetings. Thus the next closing date for applications is 9 June 2008.

Gift Aid Allocations

The first round of Gift Aid proposals was 16 in number. Two ideas were not worked up to the point were they could be considered. The following proposals were supported -

Walking Group H - group membership of YHA to be made available to all SU3A Groups - £25.50

French Intermediate – portable CD player - £25

Walking Group H and Natural History II - GPS and laminated maps, including GPS training - £150

Enjoying Opera Groups I and II - DVDs of important productions (to be made available across SU3A) - £300

Walking Group J - safety equipment - £30

Birdwatching II - bird identification DVDs (available to other similar Groups) - £75

Crown Green Bowling - set of woods for use by new/possible members - £60

Walking Group F - safety equipment including GPS and training - £150

Music Appreciation - small hi-fi centre - £120

Walk Sheffield - contribution from SU3A towards cost of publicising city-wide event involving SU3A members - £250

A proposal for £250 of matched funding for a fund-raising project for Edale Mountain Rescue was delayed for further consideration. Two proposals totalling £103 were not supported.

Walk Sheffield

SU3A Walking Groups and walkers will be taking leading roles in *Walk Sheffield* - the City's coming walking festival. The aim is to encourage more walking - bringing health, environmental and recreational benefits to more people. *Walk Sheffield* starts on Friday 30 May and runs for 10 days. All SU3A members and the wider public are invited to take part.

On 30 May the Lord Mayor will perform the opening ceremony outside the Town Hall at 9.45 am. Our Chairman, Joan Keogh, will be there. The ceremony will be followed by a short half-hour walk, led by The Ramblers' Association, round historic city centre locations.

SU3A's contribution begins on Sunday 1 June when the Sunday Walking Group leads off from Meadowhall Interchange on the first leg of the Sheffield Country Walk. This 54 mile route goes round

the perimeter of the City. It has been split into eight consecutive daily sections finishing back at Meadowhall on the following Sunday. Some sections are urban in nature; others follow country lanes and footpaths crossing farmland, woods and moors. All are linear with start and finishing points accessed by public transport. Each will be led by one or two of our walking groups.



To honour our involvement, our Woodworking Group has carved a memorial baton which will be passed from Group to Group to travel the whole way round the City. Joan Keogh will hand over the baton to Stella Longden, the leader of the first leg, at the start.

The walks will be joined by some members of The Ramblers' Association and are open to the public. SU3A members not in the leading Groups will be most welcome too; anyone wishing to take part is asked to notify the section's leader(s) beforehand.

Drinking a Hostel Dry!

Recently eight members of Walking Group H went for a mid-week break to Swaledale in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. We used the YHA Group Card, which saved the Group £48, and we also tried out our new GPS (also courtesy of Gift Aid). We stayed at Grinton Lodge Youth Hostel, which was built in Victorian times as a hunting lodge, and which stands in an imposing position on high ground overlooking the villages of Grinton and Reeth.

The hostel has had a complete refurbishment and is very comfortable. There had been talk of us walking into Reeth for a pub meal, but as soon as we saw the steepness of the road up to the hostel we all decided to eat 'in house'. A wise choice as the food was good, likewise the organic wines. In fact by the end of our visit the hostel had run out of red wine!

We had one full day's walk of 12 miles and two half day walks of 7/8 miles each. Among the highlights of the trip were seeing the spectacular Aysgarth Falls, with the river in full spate, and on the second day our antics in trying to get through a large area of bog and reeds. It provided amusement for the ones who reached the other side first! Our drinks afterwards in the King's Arms at Reeth were well deserved! The third highlight has to be the variety and sheer number of birds we saw and heard - such as curlews, oyster catchers, dippers, sand martins, redshanks, yellow wagtails and golden plovers. It really felt as though Spring had arrived at last.

We saw very few people while we were walking, which added to the enjoyment. The Dales scenery has been described as being different from anywhere else. Part of this is because of its limestone landscape which contours with meadows, heather clad moors and ancient woodland. We had a very relaxing few days and can recommend youth hostelling to any group wanting a few days away.
