Open groups are open to all Sheffield U3A members.

For some events, like the Friday Lectures, you just need to turn up in good time for a seat. Other activities require you to send in a booking form, often with a deposit and SAE. The booking forms will be found in the Links and Links Supplement and should be returned to the person named.

So if you want to go to listen to some classical music, listen to one of the monthly lectures, go on a weekend away, learn more about our great city through walking, go on a day trip near or far or to travel Europe, one of the Open Groups is just for you. These are great opportunities to meet new people, see new places, and learn.

Travel Audio System:

To further enhance the tours where guides are used, SU3A have invested in the Whisper Audio system. Basically you have a receiver around your neck and an earpiece. The guide wears a transmitter and talks normally. Through the ear piece you can hear the guide up to 100m away. Ideal for those city walks or when visiting country houses and churches. For those who wear hearing aids with a 'T' switch, loop receivers are available. Just let the organiser know in advance. If you prefer to use your own headphones, or earpiece with a standard 3.5mm earphone jack (as used on a mobile phone, iPod, iPad and portable radios), then just take it with you on your journey.

Important Notice

At the next AGM in July, both the Chair and Treasurer are stepping down. Please read the job descriptions below and apply for any of the posts that you think are most suitable. If you are interested, in the first instance please contact our Secretary at *secretarysu3a.org.uk*

TREASURER

The overall role of the Treasurer is to maintain an overview of SU3A's affairs, helping ensure the organisation's financial viability and that proper financial records and procedures are maintained.

Responsibilities:

- Serving on the Committee (usually meeting bi-monthly) and other committees if appointed
- Presenting at every Committee meeting up to date accounts and details of all payments made since the previous committee meeting
- Presenting budgets for approval by the Committee.
- Supporting the Committee in the development of a financial strategy to ensure that:
 - the financial resources of the organisation meet its present and future needs
 - appropriate reserves, investment and risk policies are in place and regularly reviewed
 - accounting procedures and security procedures are constantly reviewed and upgraded whenever necessary
 - there is no conflict between any investment held and the aims and objectives of the charity

- Ensuring that the accounts are prepared and disclosed in the form required by funders and the relevant statutory bodies, eg the Charity Commission
- Advising on the financial implications of the strategic plan and annual work programme
- Monitoring investment activity and ensuring its consistency with policies and legal responsibilities
- Ensuring that the accounts are examined in the manner required and that any recommendation of the Independent Examiner is reported to the Committee
- Providing for publication in Links the examined accounts and Independent Examiners Report
- Keeping the Committee informed about its financial duties and responsibilities
- Contributing to the fundraising strategy of the organisation
- Making a formal presentation of the accounts at the annual general meeting and drawing attention to important points in a coherent and easily understandable way
- Sitting on recruitment panels as required
- Submitting annual returns, including to the Charity Commission
- Submitting gift aid claims to HMR&C
- Ensuring that Groups accounts are submitted to the Treasurer, where required by the Guidelines for Coordinators.

Skills:

- In addition to the qualities needed by all trustees, the Treasurer should ideally also possess the following:
 - financial qualifications and experience
 - some experience of charity finance and the voluntary sector generally
 - the skills to analyse proposals and examine their financial consequences
 - a preparedness to make unpopular recommendations to the Committee
 - a willingness to be available to other members for advice and enquiries on an ad hoc basis.

CHAIR

The overall role of the Chair is to lead the Committee, ensuring that it fulfils its responsibilities for the governance of the organisation. The Chair should ensure the full participation of all Committee members and work with other committee members on recruitment and orientation of new Committee.

Responsibilities:

- Providing leadership for the Committee in their role of setting the strategy and policy of the organisation
- Working with the other officers to plan the annual cycle of Committee meetings and the agenda for those meetings. Chairing Committee meetings
- Monitoring that decisions taken at those meetings are implemented; representing the organisation at functions and meetings and acting as spokesperson as appropriate
- Working with other Committee members to resolve difficulties arising within the organisation.

In addition to the skills needed by all trustees the Chair should also possess the following:

- Leadership skills
- Comfortable with using the internet and communicating via email
- Experience of committee work
- Sensitivity to and tolerance of differing views
- Friendly, responsive and patient approach; personal integrity
- Impartiality, fairness and the ability to respect confidences
- Specific knowledge of the work of U3As and a commitment to that work
- Knowledge of SU3A's mission, services, policies and programmes and commitment to its values
- Awareness of the wider voluntary sector and other relevant networks.

2. Accommodation

Once you have registered you will be supplied with a list of guest houses and B&Bs, all
of which are within easy walking distance of the two main venues; St John Ambulance
Hall (SJAH) and Whitby Pavilion. However you are of course at liberty to book your own
preferred accommodation. Unless you live close to Whitby you will need to book
accommodation for the nights of 23rd and 24th, with the 25th optional for those who
wish to sample Whitby's many other attractions on Friday the 26th.

3. Accessibility

- The SJAH and the Pavilion both have easy flat access for those with accessibility problems.
- Please note that the Captain Cook museum in Whitby is on four floors, and only the ground and first floor have access by lift.
- The museum in Marton has easy flat access, though there is a 15-minute walk from the coach park to the museum. There are stairs in the Museum in Great Ayton, but there is a lift for wheelchair users.
- It is a 15-minute downhill walk (uphill back!) from SJAH to the Captain Cook museum; transport can be arranged if necessary.

4. The Outline Programme

- Tuesday 23rd June, 6pm Welcome Reception with drinks, and information about the programme.
- Wednesday 24th June 9.30-12.30, lectures and films to the whole group at SJAH, with coffee break. Buffet lunch at SJAH. 2pm, visit to Captain Cook Museum and guided walk around the historic East side of Whitby, finishing at around 5pm. Evening event, including dinner, musical entertainment and dancing, at the Pavilion, starting at 7.30pm.
- Thursday 24th June Two coaches depart from Whitby simultaneously at 9.15am. Group
 1 will visit the birthplace site at Marton in the morning, finishing around 12 noon, and moving
 on to lunch at a local hostelry, then arrive at Great Ayton approx 2pm, visiting the school
 and looking round the village, departing around 4pm. Group 2 will arrive at Great Ayton at
 10am, leaving at 12 noon for lunch at a different hostelry, then on to Marton, arriving approx
 2pm, departing 4pm. Upon arrival back in Whitby there will be a final get together for the
 whole group at SJAH (around 5pm), with information about optional activities for those
 staying on until Friday. The event will close at approximately 5.30pm

'first come first seated'. Lectures are held in Cinema 4 at the Showroom Cinema, Paternoster Row. They start at 11 am, finishing by 12.30 pm. Greeters with U3A lanyards are at the door to welcome new members.

A voucher, obtainable from the box office, enables half-price parking at Q-park (the Cheesegrater) on Charles Street off Arundel Gate. 21 February. What would Ethel do? Tomo Thompson, Chief Executive CPRE (South Yorks and Peak District). A talk about the history and work of the Peak District, from the journey of a young woman in mourning to the moors East of Sheffield, through the establishment of the first National Park and the first Green Belt to their current work as they near their centenary. Tomo Thompson is a retired British Army Officer and a passionate advocate of the benefits of the outdoor environment. There will be a retiring collection in aid of the work of the Peak Park.

20 March. Treading the Boards at Haworth Parsonage. Dr. Amber Regis, Senior Lecturer, University of Sheffield. The opening of the museum at the Bronte Parsonage in 1928 was followed by a decade of biodrama. This talk explores how 'the Brontë myth' was constructed upon the 1930s stage via its dramatisation of archival remains and museum objects.

17 April. The Contribution of the University to Sheffield Life. Universities are no longer 'ivory towers'. They are expected to involve themselves in the local community at both a strategic level and on a day to day basis. **Professor Koen Lamberts, Vice-Chancellor, University of Sheffield** will outline the many collaborations between t own and gown.

Lecture Report December 2019 Sheffield's Father Christmas, JG Graves, by Mike Spick

In the beating heart of this 21st century city, Mike Spick, former Local Studies librarian, revealed the magnanimity and vision of a latterday businessman and benefactor, John George Graves, George to his friends. He rose from an apprentice jeweller, working 12 hour shifts to become a wealthy philanthropist, whose bounty is still making a difference in all our lives.

Horncastle. Lincolnshire. Born in in 1866. he moved to Heckmondwike in 1874 to attend Batley Boys' Grammar School before arriving in Shalesmoor in 1880 to take up an apprenticeship at Wishman's jewellery. He was a devout Christian attending first Townhead Baptist church, before joining a ministry on Carver Street. By adjusting the Wishman policy of full payment before receiving a product, to one of credit and payment by instalments, his business flourished. He started with jewellery and watches, but extended to widen his manufacturing base and import products for sale, initially Swiss watches.

He feared for the health of Sheffielders drinking alcohol to excess, as water was not safe. He supported the Salvation Army and funded a hostel for the homeless on Fitzwilliam Street, later replaced by the current hostel. He was active in the YMCA and contemplated the life of a missionary. Happily,for Sheffield, his influence was considerable based on the success of his mail order empire. He employed a workforce of 3000, mostly women, who worked for less pay, with men in managerial and packing roles. In his work canteen, he ensured his staff ate a hot meal at subsidised prices and took them out to dine at his expense. He provided garden parties for his workers in the grounds of his home, Riverdale, close to Endcliffe Park, which included ping pong, button and potty racing to name just a few.

Today he is remembered by those who walk in his many parks, the largest is Graves Park. Also Eccleshall woods, recently added a visitor centre through his charitable trust. He invested in over 3000 paintings, 700 now hang in Graves Gallery, above the central library. He gave a new wing to the children's hospital and established the Institute of Radiotherapy, a forerunner to Weston Park. He declined a knighthood. but will be remembered for providing the green lungs of the city, a healthy antidote to its more toxic history. Our thanks go to Mike for an inspiring insight into our generous benefactor, whose influence will appreciated generations. be bv future

Barbara Hutton, Sue Connelly, Martin Harvey, and Sarah Williamson invite you to their first Lunch and Lecture at the Doubletree by Hilton Sheffield Park Hotel, Chesterfield Road South, Meadowhead, Sheffield, S8 8BW on **Friday 22 May, 2020**.

Speaker **Ron Clayton** (*https://sheffieldhistorytours.com/about-ron/*) a local Historian will give a lively and stimulating talk on the subject of **Sheffield Castle**, arguably the most enigmatic castle in England. In 1270 a stone castle was erected to replace the 'motte and bailey' structure which burnt down in 1266. Sheffield Castle, in its heyday, was possibly as large as Warwick Castle and was demolished, circa 1649, after it held out against Parliamentary Forces in August 1644.

Please arrive at 1200 md for a 1230 pm start. Cost **£20.00.** This new price fully reflects the increased cost of the meal, speaker and staff gratuities. The last Lunch and Lecture was subsidised, and we cannot afford to do that in the future. However, we feel it is still excellent value.

There is ample parking at the hotel and the numbers 24, 43 and 43a buses from the city centre stop outside the hotel. The number 75 bus from Shiregreen via High Street stops near the hotel at Meadowhead.

Travel Group Visit to Leicester -Wednesday 22nd April 2020

Leicester is an historic and interesting city to visit. On arrival at the King Richard III Visitor Centre following a welcome cup of coffee/tea we will be free to explore the Centre.

Richard III was the last English King to die in battle and to be DNA tested. The Centre tells the story of his life, death on the battlefield and the amazing discovery of his remains in a city centre car park. The use of modern forensic techniques made it possible to prove that the remains were King Richard. His original gravesite is at the Centre.

Our lunch of soup and sandwiches will be served to us around 12.30 at the Centre. The entrance ticket is valid for the day so we can leave and return as we please.

After lunch you are free to visit the many interesting places nearby. The Cathedral is well worth a visit. Do make sure that you see the sanctuary in the Cathedral where Richard's tomb is located. The Medieval Guildhall near the Cathedral is also worth a visit. Upstairs there is the 3rd oldest library in the country.

The New Walk Art Gallery and Museum is approximately a 15-minute walk from the Centre and a visit is recommended. Amongst its many treasures there is a stunning collection of Picasso's ceramics given to the Museum in memory of their daughter and grand-daughter by Richard Attenborough and his wife. It was collected by them during many visits to France and to Picasso's workshop.

The cost of this day visit is £31.00. This includes coach travel, driver's gratuity and admission to the King Richard III Visitor Centre. Coffee/ tea and biscuits on arrival and the soup and sandwich lunch are also included.

During this five day break we will have some interesting and enjoyable visits from our base at the Ipswich Holiday Inn. One of these will be to Sutton Hoo – the burial ground of Anglo-Saxon kings and the site of a 90-foot longship which contained amazing treasures and artefacts. A National Trust guide will tell us about the people who lived here and also about those who discovered this important place. We can visit the exhibition hall and the house of the landowner who started the excavations in 1939. There is a café and a new observation tower from which the whole site may be viewed.



The Suffolk countryside was the inspiration for some of Constable's most famous works including "The Hay Wain" and "Flatford Mill". Our guide will tell us some of history of the place and the people who lived and worked around Flatford. As well as these two National Trust properties we will also be visiting two or three of the small Suffolk seaside towns and have an afternoon cruise on the River Orwell.

On the journey from Sheffield, our lunchtime break will be at Thursford. We can ride on the vintage "merry-go-rounds" and hear the lively music from the automated fairground organs. There is a café to have some lunch before we travel on to the hotel.

On our homeward journey our final visit will be to Flag Fen near Peterborough. This is Britain's Bronze Age Centre which is one of the most important archaeological sites in Europe. Excavations have revealed many swords and other metal objects and jewellery and the remains of a very long causeway. The reconstructed Bronze Age and Iron Age round houses give us a glimpse into life in prehistoric Britain.

The cost of this short break on a half-board (dinner, bed and breakfast) basis is £350 per person sharing a double or twin room and £400 for single occupancy of a room. If you would like to apply for a place, please complete the form and return it to Margaret Bullivant.

TRAVEL GROUP DAY VISIT TO WHITBY – Wednesday 13th MAY 2020

This visit will allow time to explore the back lanes and market place, visit the Captain Cook Museum or Pannett Park Art Gallery or just sit and watch the boats in the harbour. There are plenty of places to have lunch or you may like to take your own picnic but mind the seagulls!

In the afternoon we will board the coach for the short journey to Whitby Headland for a guided tour of the parish church of St. Mary. In AD 1110 a simple stone church was built here, and it has since been altered and enlarged to accommodate more parishioners as the town's population grew. It has some interesting features and our guide will tell us some of the stories about the place and the people who have been there over the centuries.



After our church visit, we will go to the ruins of Whitby Abbey. The first monastery here was founded in AD 657 by King Oswy of Northumberland. It was an Anglo-Saxon "double monastery" for men and women and was ruled over by the formidable royal princess Abbess Hild. This is an English Heritage property and when we check in as a group information leaflets will be available.

There is a café nearby run by the YHA where you can get a drink and snack before boarding the coach for our journey home.

The cost per person for this day visit is £15.40 which includes a donation to the church, coach fare and driver gratuity.
