














Open groups are open to all Sheffield U3A members.

For some events, like the Friday Lectures, you just need to turn up in good time for a seat. Other activities require you to send in a booking form, often with a deposit and SAE. The booking forms will be found in the Links and Links Supplement and should be returned to the person named.

Travel Audio System:

To further enhance the tours where guides are used, SU3A have invested in the Whisper Audio system. Basically you have a receiver around your neck and an earpiece. The guide wears a transmitter and talks normally. Through the ear piece you can hear the guide up to 100m away. Ideal for those city walks or when visiting country houses and churches. For those who wear hearing aids with a 'T' switch, loop receivers are available. Just let the organiser know in advance. If you prefer to use your own headphones, or earpiece with a standard 3.5mm earphone jack (as used on a mobile phone, ipod, ipad and portable radios), then just take it with you on your journey.

Steel City Wanderers

Steel City Wanderers is an open group which explores the culture, geography and energy of Sheffield in the form of short, guided walks.

Highlights from 2017 included; Sheffield's Sons and Daughters, linking together memories provided by some of our city's most famous sons and daughters; multi-award winning musicians, authors and artists, poets, politicians, world champions, athletes and even an astronaut – so popular we ran the walk twice. We had the return of Brian Clark with his encyclopaedic knowledge of the Sheffield music scene bringing music and rhythm into a walk.

Two of our walks started outside the city centre when Matt and Harry guided us from Hillsborough and Neepsend in an exploration of the unusual vegetation that flourishes in Sheffield – including rare orchids in a road side verge, combined with history, industry and architecture, plus a pub or two.

In October we returned to the Off the Shelf Festival of Words with a U3A performance of specially written and all original music, stories, prose, poems and singing. Not much walking that morning, instead a demonstration that us "more experienced of life" folks can continue to contribute to the energy and culture of Sheffield

The year ended with our first indoor walk, a tour of the Madina Mosque, a brief introduction to Islam and the challenging of some preconceptions.

Planning for 2018

We'll also have a ramble around the history and significance of Manor Top and down to the City Centre.

Still at the conceptual phase for 2018 are; a meander through murder, blood money, miscarriage of justice and misuse of power in 17th. & 18th. century Sheffield, we had meant this walk for last year but the best laid plans etc. For this walk we will need readers with some amateur dramatics experience – a rich vein in Sheffield U3A, do get in touch.

Perhaps a revisit of the street art scene, so much has changed, so much demolition, so many new buildings and still so many back streets to explore. With our contacts amongst street artists perhaps this will be artist led followed by a workshop to create your own street art.

How many blue plaques do you think adorn Sheffield? We may have a go at finding out or at least stride around a "best of" selection. The wonderful hospitality we received at the Wolseley Road Mosque may have initiated a theme. We do need to repeat the Sheffield U3A Autumn Artistic Performance.

16 February - Deeds not Words: The story of women's rights, then and now

Dr Helen Pankhurst

On the 100th anniversary of women getting the vote, Helen Pankhurst - great-granddaughter of suffragette leader Emmeline Pankhurst and a leading women's rights campaigner - charts how women's lives have changed over the last century, and offers a powerful and positive argument for a new way forward.

Dr Helen Pankhurst is a women's rights activist and senior advisor to CARE International, working in the UK and in Ethiopia. She is a trustee of ActionAid, a Visiting Senior Fellow at LSE and Visiting Professor at MMU.

16 March - A happy accident: the meeting of three great artists in St Ives

Andy Pollard, Senior Lecturer in Creative Media, Sheffield Hallam University

In this illustrated lecture, Andy will explore the impact on English modern art of a chance meeting in 1928 between London modernist Ben Nicholson, his young contemporary Christopher Wood and the 'fisherman artist' Alfred Wallis in St Ives. Paintings by all three will illustrate their mutually inspired approach to Cornwall's landscape and people.

This encounter has gone down in legend in the history of the St Ives artists' colony, not least because it changed the artistic course of all three painters. Self-taught Wallis's 'naïve' paintings presented Nicholson and Wood with the new direction towards spontaneity and simplicity they had been searching for in their art.


Gardening at Whirlowbrook Park - dates for your diary?

Southwell Minster and Workhouse

Saturday 17 March 2018

Said by many to be the best-kept secret among the 42 English cathedrals, Southwell Minster dates from 1108 when the rebuilding of the earlier Anglo-Saxon church began. The church contains one of the finest Norman naves in Europe, the magnificent Angel window and the world-renowned Chapter House with its leaves of Southwell carvings. We will have a guided tour of the Minster after which there will be free time for lunch. There is a refectory in the Minster or you may wish to explore the town.

In the afternoon we travel the short distance to the Workhouse where you can follow in the steps of the Victorian poor. Built in 1824, it is the most complete workhouse in existence. Its architecture was influenced by prison design and its harsh régime became a blueprint for workhouses throughout the country. There will be a short introductory talk after which you will be free to explore the building and the recreated Victorian vegetable garden.

There is a cafe which sells snacks and hot drinks.

The cost of the trip is £27 which includes the coach, the driver's gratuity, the tour of the Minster and entry to the Workhouse.

Black Country Museum

Sunday 29 April 2018

Our visit to this 26 acre, open-air museum, near Birmingham with its carefully reconstructed houses, shops and workshops, will give you a glimpse of 300 years of Black Country history, including village life, transport, industry and education.

You can ride on a trolley bus or a vintage tram, try a canal trip, venture down a coal mine to experience the reality of a 19th century coal miner's life, see a replica of Thomas Newcomen's steam engine, visit the school to experience a lesson from the past (can you remember your times tables?), buy home-made sweets from an old-fashioned shop or hook a duck at the fun fair. Travel Group Visit to Victoria Baths and Gorton Monastery, Manchester

Tuesday 17 April 2018

Victoria Baths is Britain's finest historic municipal swimming baths. In 2003 it was voted in the programme "Restoration" as the building BBC 2 viewers wanted to be restored. We will see the many decorative features that have been restored, including stained glass windows, mosaic floors, glass block paving and the Turkish Baths suite.

Our "Discover Victoria Baths" tour is led by an experienced guide who will tell us about the history of the building, the restoration process and the campaign to bring the building back into use for swimming including using the Turkish Baths. On arrival, we will have coffee and biscuits before our tour followed by a sandwich lunch.

After lunch the coach takes us the short distance to Gorton Monastery once a thriving church and home to the Franciscan Brothers. When they left, it fell into disuse due to housing clearance. Fortunately, enthusiastic supporters worked towards its restoration with grants totalling £6.5 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund, the European Union Social Fund and fundraising events.


The monastery is one of Edward Pugin"s architectural masterpieces and ranks along the Taj Mahal and the ruins of Pompeii. it is listed among the 100 most endangered sites. We will have free time to see videos of the restoration, the Heritage Centre and the gardens. During the afternoon tea and cakes will be served.

Travel Group Visit to Tissington Hall and Village Welldressings

Monday 14 May 2018



The first welldressing ceremony to be recorded took place on Ascension Day in 1350 at Tissington in the Derbyshire Peak District. The Church-led service was a form of thanksgiving both for the continuous supply of water from the wells and also for its purity. It was believed that the clear waters had saved the villagers from the Black Death – the worst single epidemic of bubonic plague ever experienced in Europe.

We will start with a guided tour of Tissington Hall and gardens with arboretum and rose garden. The hall was built by Francis Fitzherbert in 1609 and it has been lived in by the Fitzherbert family ever since.

After the guided tour, there will be plenty of time for you to get refreshments at one of the pubs or tearoom before finding your way around the village wells and the church.

The cost per person for this trip is £18.60 which covers coach travel, driver's gratuity and tour of the Hall. No refreshments are included.

Study Day: Exploring ideas of Identity & Nationality

Thursday 19 April 2018 at **10.30** at The Arundel Room in the Millennium Gallery

Recent turbulent world events - Brexit, increased migrations across Europe, for example - have prompted people in many countries to examine who they are and what are the identifying characteristics of being part of their society. On what criteria do we base our ideas of nationality? How valid are these? Are nationality and identity the same? During this study day we hope to explore some of these themes with the help of three speakers with expertise in this area.

Format of the day:

Lecture 1: 10.30- 11.30 (talk followed by questions): Comfort Blanket: securing works on the theme of identity in Sheffield's collection.

Liz Waring (Curator of Visual Art, Graves Gallery). Liz will talk about the Grayson Perry tapestry, *Comfort Blanket*, and place it in the context of the collecting theme of identity. She will also refer to other works collected around this theme (please visit the Graves gallery to see the tapestry particularly. There will be time to do this at the end of the day also).

Lecture 2: 11.50-12.50: Britons and Brexit.

Professor Antony Taylor, Professor of Modern British History at Sheffield Hallam University: This lecture will consider the changing parameters of national identity in the United Kingdom in the first quarter of the twenty-first century (further info. on su3a website). Professor Taylor has published widely in the field of 19th century British History and has expertise in the history of ideas and the use of the past by politicians in Britain, amongst other areas.
