



Open groups are open to all Sheffield U3A members.

For some events, like the Friday Lectures, you just need to turn up in good time for a seat. Other activities require you to send in a booking form, often with a deposit and SAE. The booking forms will be found in the Links and Links Supplement and should be returned to the person named.

So if you want to go to listen to some classical music, listen to one of the monthly lectures, go on a weekend away, learn more about our great city through walking, go on a day trip near or far or to travel Europe, one of the Open Groups is just for you.

These are great opportunities to meet new people, see new places, and learn.

Travel Audio System:

To further enhance the tours where guides are used, SU3A have invested in the Whisper Audio system. Basically you have a receiver around your neck and an earpiece. The guide wears a transmitter and talks normally. Through the ear piece you can hear the guide up to 100m away. Ideal for those city walks or when visiting country houses and churches. For those who wear hearing aids with a 'T' switch, loop receivers are available. Just let the organiser know in advance. If you prefer to use your own headphones, or earpiece with a standard 3.5mm earphone jack (as used on a mobile phone, ipod, iPad and portable radios), then just take it with you on your journey.

Travel Insurance A Gentle Reminder

Happy New Year from Brian, Fran, Phil and myself, your European Travel Group!

We would like to highlight the possible implications of not having adequate personal Travel Insurance in place when applying for any of our trips.

All members are responsible for arranging their own insurance to cover the costs of cancellation (whether the deposit or full amount) through sickness, personal injury, any change of personal circumstances, accidents and loss of or damage to luggage or personal property.

Sheffield U3A cannot be responsible for any such claims

The importance of having travel insurance in place at the time of application cannot be stressed enough.

Should you have successfully applied for a trip but are not departing until 6-8 months later, you may be tempted to leave arranging your insurance cover until nearer the time of departure. We appreciate that getting Travel Insurance can be difficult and expensive for some of our members. However it would be very remiss of us to not highlight the fact that should you, for whatever reason, have to withdraw from the trip and you have not organised your travel insurance in a timely manner you will lose your deposit or even the full amount depending upon when you cancel.

Steel City Wanderers is an open group which explores the culture, geography and energy of Sheffield in the form of short, guided walks. We finished our 2018 programme with three walks;

An exploration of the rich history of Parkwood Springs and Rutland Road led by Denis and Matt, taking a hundred years or so journey through the changing industry and landscape of this area of Sheffield, and memories of growing up in a part of our city which we have only occasionally visited on our walks, but which we must visit again.

Sheffield is a city of architectural gems whose appreciation can be heightened by an engaging, enthusiastic and knowledgeable guide. Elaine led us through some of the most significant achievements of the Flockton architectural practice; including Weston Park, important churches and the complex of buildings on Mappin Street and Portobello Road for the University of Sheffield.

Our final walk of the year took us back to Street Art and Feature Walls, and also a view of the consequences of the once united but hierarchical street art community engaging in necessary growing pains or civil war – depending on your view. Some great art in unusual places and seldom trodden back streets.

Coming Up in 2019.

As the winter draws on we leave the streets and plan for 2019.

Following our first "indoor" walk last February to the Sheffield Islamic Center and Madina Masjid, we are seeking to organise an indoor visit to one of Sheffield's two Buddhist centres.

For the Spring, plans are well advanced for a repeat of the oversubscribed last November Street Art Walk. A new set of Blue Plaques and commemorative monuments has been prepared by Rob. Also from history, but underpinning much of our society today, Denise will take us on a tour of the radical political history of Sheffield. Seeing and hearing how much has been achieved but also how much remains to be changed. Into the summer we will have a revisit of the Sheffield Poetry and Poets walk from 2016 – with some new poems set in Sheffield and several old favourites, and there will be two linked walks; Sheffield's Changing Landscapes and an environment meets industrial change stroll in no doubt brilliant Sheffield sunshine – advance thanks to Phil, Matt, Mike and Denis.

Looking even further ahead into the autumn, there could be some music, a soupcon of Architecture, a squiggle of Iconography, maybe some Sheffield Women and a homeless Invisible City. But, much can change – if you are on our email list you will receive notification of all walks a month in advance.

One final walk needs preparing

Steel City Wanderers has twice had themed walks as part of the Off the Sheffield Literary Festival held each autumn in Sheffield. We had a rest last year but are coming back invigorated and intend to offer "A Misguided Tour of Sheffield".

For this walk to go ahead we will require probably 10 authors, each to write a 3 minute piece about a building or location in central Sheffield. Of the ten, some will be entirely false and some contain the occasional truth. Rather like the BCC Radio 4 programme "*The Unbelievable Truth*", available on iPlayer and if you haven't heard it, do seek it out.

We need 10 authors, and if you'd like to be involved or to receive more information as this develops, no commitment needed right now (!), do get in touch and we can together develop this concept into an Off the Sheffield project.

If you would like to be alerted to future walks, please email us. If you have previously been in touch, we will already have you on our emailing list to receive invitations to future walks.

If you have an idea for a walk, please get in touch, we can support you with the logistics and organisation leaving you free to supply the imagination.

We are always looking for volunteers to design and lead a walk, and if you have a memory, some history or just a little knowledge about Sheffield we would love to hear from you.

A big thank you to our supporters & regular walkers – grand to see you every time.

Plastic has all sorts of great uses - in the toothbrush we use first thing in the morning, in our clothes, in avoiding food waste - even our smart phone depends on plastic. But everyone seems to hate it! We see plastics most often in packaging and less than 3% actually gets recycled globally, with devastating effects on the environment. So what can and should we do about it?



Tony Ryan is the Director of The Grantham Centre for Sustainable Futures & Professor of Physical Chemistry at the University of Sheffield.

Visit to Barton on Humber, Watersedge Country Park and Visitor Centre, and Beverley

Wednesday 15th May 2019

We shall leave Knowle Lane at 8.15am and the Interchange at 8.30am to travel to Barton on Humber.



Our arrival is scheduled for 10.30am when we hope to visit St. Peter's Church – confirmation pending from English Heritage. It is one of the most studied churches in England, its history traced over a thousand years containing a complete Anglo-Saxon tower and a rare Baptistry dating from 970 AD. Barton itself is a very interesting town with its merchant houses, Georgian and

Victorian streets.

From here we shall travel to the Watersedge Country Park and Visitor Centre for a soup and sandwich lunch. There will be time to explore the Centre itself and the immediate vicinity with views of the Humber Bridge.

After lunch Beverley is our destination. You will be free to visit the Minster. A magnificent example of Gothic architecture, its features include misericords, a Percy tomb canopy and a large collection of carvings of medieval musicians in wood and stone. You may wish to explore another notable building in the town namely St. Mary's 12th century church at Hungate, a former centre for the Guild of Minstrels in the north of England. The sculpture of the Pilgrim Rabbit was, reputedly, the inspiration for the White Rabbit in Allice in Wonderland.

Time permitting you may wish to visit the Art Gallery or take tea and cake at the Cosy Café near the Minster from which we will leave for Sheffield at 4.30pm.

The cost is £20.50 per person. This includes coach fare, gratuities for the driver, donation to Beverley Minster and lunch at the Watersedge Park café. To reserve a place, please complete the booking form and send it with a small s.a.e. and your cheque to Valerie Wiley as soon as possible.

New Year's Resolution . . . ?

Reading support in Schools is. Your local Primary School would welcome your coming in for a few hours a week during term-time to listen to young readers.

Your local Library. 16 of the libraries in Sheffield are now community-run. They are run <u>entirely</u> by volunteers and rely completely on them.

Often the support requirement is a few hours a month: sometimes it is few hours a week. Sometimes it is when you can fit it in.

Library assistant; Library session supervisor

Books and materials assistant; Under 5s activity assistant*

Children's holiday activity organiser*/assistant*

Trustee/Board member; Publicity lead/assistant

Displays assistant*; Housekeeping/Cleaning*

Building / maintenance lead/assistant*

IT Support; Volunteer support; Fund-raising*;

Events organiser*/assistant*; Health and safety assistant

Community outreach worker*; Safeguarding officer.

Why not ask at <u>your</u> local library? You'll get a friendly welcome and you don't have to do it forever. A few hours a week for a year from everyone in SU3A would help keep all our libraries open for the next decade. And the next

Travel Group Visit to The National Science and Media Museum and Cartwright Hall Bradford

Tuesday 18th June 2019

Founded in 1983 as The National Museum of Photography, Film and Television, The National Science and Media Museum was refurbished and relaunched in 2007 to include web and digital technologies in its interactive exhibits.

On arrival at the museum, we will have coffee and biscuits. A free – flow visit system allows you to choose which aspects of the collection you are interested in. Lunch is available there or you can cross Centenary Square (just outside the Museum entrance) where there is a selection of places to eat.



After lunch we will board the coach for a short drive to Cartwright Hall. This is Bradford's Civic Art Gallery set in Lister Park. There are collections of British 19th and 20th century art.

The latest addition is the David Hockney Gallery opened to celebrate his 80th birthday.

David is Bradford born and the Gallery includes some of his early work with a focus on Yorkshire and Bradford.

- (e) Seasonal fruit salad with vanilla icecream


