



Travel Audio System:

To further enhance the tours where guides are used, SU3A have invested in the Whisper Audio system. Basically you have a receiver around your neck and an earpiece. The guide wears a transmitter and talks normally. Through the ear piece you can hear the guide up to 100m away. Ideal for those city walks or when visiting country houses and churches. For those who wear hearing aids with a 'T' switch, loop receivers are available. Just let the organiser know in advance. If you prefer to use your own headphones, or earpiece with a standard 3.5mm earphone jack (as used on a mobile phone, ipod, iPad and portable radios), then just take it with you on your journey.

Travel Group Visit to Coventry Cathedral and Cultural Heritage

Wednesday 16 October 2019

St Michael's, Coventry was the only English cathedral to be destroyed in the Second World War. In 1940, Coventry was devastated in the single most concentrated attack on a British city during the War. The cathedral burned and was left as a shell, having been hit by several incendiary devices.

The decision to rebuild the cathedral was taken the morning after its destruction. Rebuilding signalled a sign of faith, trust and hope for the future of the world. The vision was to lead the people of Coventry away from feelings of bitterness and hatred. This has led to the cathedral's Ministry of Peace and Reconciliation, which has provided spiritual and practical support in areas of conflict throughout the world and also to preserve the remains of the old cathedral as a moving reminder of the folly and waste of war. It is testimony to this that by 1947, Coventry had adopted its first German twin city, Kiel, with Dresden following in 1956.

The 'new' cathedral, consecrated in 1962, provided inspiration to many fine artists of the post-war era. The architect, Sir Basil Spence, commissioned work from Graham Sutherland, John Piper, Ralph Beyer, John Hutton, Jacob Epstein, Elisabeth Frink and others. The cathedral is visionary in its inspiration; a powerful expression of peace, reconciliation and internationalism and a modern architectural masterpiece.



On arrival in Coventry, we will have a guided tour of the Cathedral. We will then go the short distance to the Mediaeval Guildhall, which will be open for us to visit by special arrangement.

A carvery lunch (with vegetarian option) and tea or coffee will be served in the Guildhall Undercroft Restaurant and is included in the cost of the visit.


There will also be an opportunity to visit the nearby Herbert Art Gallery and Museum, which has a very good collection of post-war British art among other galleries and exhibits, before departing Coventry at 4pm.

16 August - Cognitive Health Dr. Daniel Blackburn, Senior Lecturer and Honorary Consultant Neurologist at Sheffield Institute for Translational Neuroscience (SITRAN), Sheffield Hallam University.

Dementia or just a poor memory? Dr Blackburn will explain the use of language and brain waves to measure cognitive health.

20 September - From Barrows to Bunkers Alex Sotheran, Archaeological Advisor for the Defence Infrastructure Organisation.

Alex will draw on his experience over several years, especially in relation to World War One sites in France, Belgium and Britain. Alex is keen to communicate with and involve many different groups of people in aspects of archaeology. He has worked on several television documentary series on First World War Sites.

18 October - Shakespeare and the Globe. Dr.Tom Rutter, Senior Lecturer in Shakespeare and Renaissance Drama, University of Sheffield.

The Globe was not the only theatrical venue in which Shakespeare's plays were performed, but it is certainly the best known today. This lecture will discuss the reasons why Shakespeare's company moved to the Globe in 1599 and show how some of his plays respond to the Globe as a playing space. It will also cover other aspects of the history of the Globe and make reference to some of the other venues in which Shakespeare's plays were performed during his lifetime.
