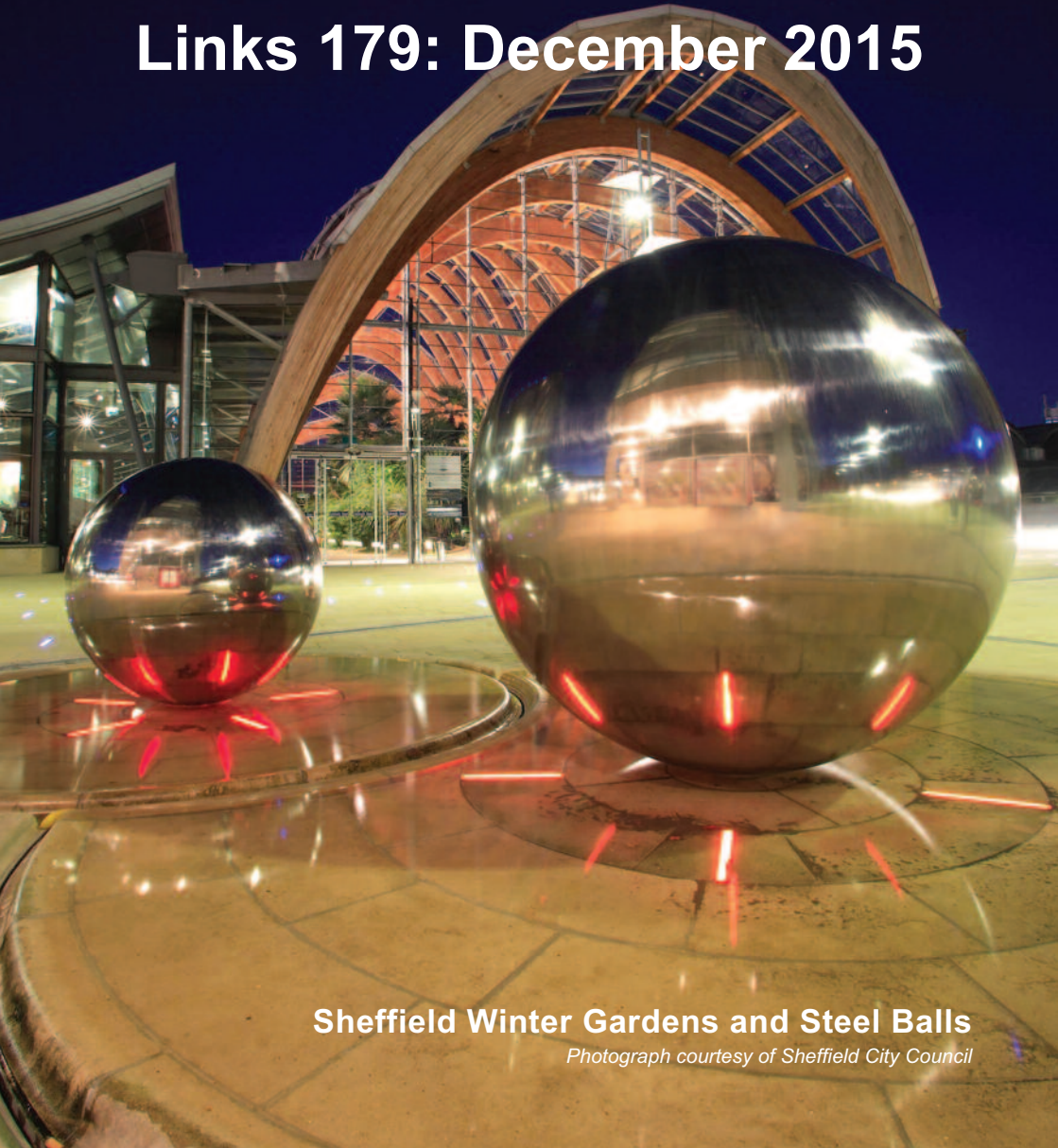

Introducing our Groups Data Manager

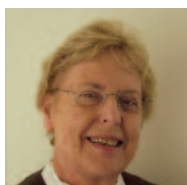

Some of our Drop-In Hospitality Team



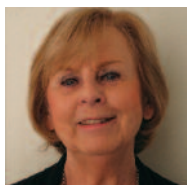

NEWS

30 YEARS ON...

2016 will mark the 30th anniversary of the founding of Sheffield University of the Third Age. At a time when many voluntary organisations quickly fall by the wayside, often due to apathy, every member of SU3A should feel proud that our organisation continues to flourish and grow. There are many reasons why this is the case, but perhaps the most important single one of these is our members' enthusiasm, loyalty, and willingness to take an interest in a wide range of different activities. It is fitting therefore in marking this event that we focus on our membership, and in particular on those who have made a contribution over many years. This article is about the activities and some of the memories of just four of our earliest members – and I am quite aware that it would be possible to write about many others!



No recollection of the growth and development of SU3A would be complete without paying a visit to Frank and Yvonne Gutsell. Our records indicate that they both joined SU3A in September 1986. Retiring respectively from the police force and from teaching, both threw themselves into the activities of the then infant organisation. An early venture was in organising what was to become Walking Group A in 1989. Surprisingly, given the

large number of walking groups now in SU3A, Frank remembers it getting off to a rather slow start, before having a regular turn-out of 15-20, and doing walks in the local Peak District. From there numbers rapidly expanded to 40 - too large for a single group, and resultantly Walking Group B was started as a spin-off, from which in turn Walking Group C evolved.

This of course presents a perfect model of how any U3A should evolve; the commitment of a few early pioneers enthusing the energies of a larger number. Walking Group A soon spread its geographical range. Walking holidays in Britain started with a trip to Conwy, North Wales, and trips

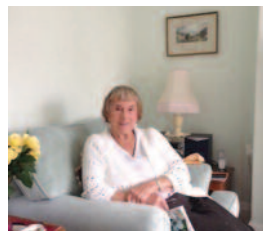
abroad followed to places such as the Auvergne and Minorca, in which both Frank and Yvonne were heavily involved.

Fairly soon, Frank became SU3A's third chairman, serving from 1991-1993. At this time SU3A was still fairly small with some 250 members – small enough to hold monthly meetings of the whole membership, with Frank estimating he knew some 50% of them personally. Yvonne in her turn started a travel group in 1990, and served as co-ordinator until 2000. The ambition and success of this group is difficult to overstate, with long-haul holidays to Australia, New Zealand and Canada as well as destinations in the UK itself.

It is worth pointing out that in their reminiscences with me they did also mention the occasional lack of success. A caravan club fairly quickly folded due to lack of support; but isn't this what U3A is all about? – have a go, follow an enthusiasm and share it with others. Most will succeed, often spectacularly, but if the odd one fails there is no need to be disheartened. Taking part is what matters!

Betty Cotterill remains a friend of the Gutsells, partly through the meetings of an informal lunch club composed of members of Walking Group A, who though no longer walking, still meet socially. This is a fine example of how friendships made through shared activities persist beyond the activity itself.

Joining in the early 1990s, Betty was herself a keen walker with Group A and a participant in many of their holidays. She also enjoyed Photography, Discussion, Natural History and Music Appreciation with SU3A. In addition to this Betty actively volunteered as well, from 1991-1995 she was membership secretary at a time when renewals were a purely pen, paper and envelope affair – a time consuming and arduous task. Betty vividly remembers debates in the Executive Committee at the time. Should membership be capped at 500? Thankfully for us the EC at the time wisely decided that opportunities for an active and enjoyable retirement should be kept open for all. Betty's commitment also extended to acting as co-ordinator for the Theatre Group – trips to Stratford, the Globe, the Lowry in Manchester and of course Sheffield theatres quickly followed. Betty's own personal favourites were London musicals with *Les Miserables* topping the list.





Marie Williams also joined in the 1990s and had a particular interest in developing IT skills. Her abilities were quickly apparent as she gained a number of proficiency certificates from the courses she attended, and became skilled in producing greetings cards from attending a course running at the time. Marie was also one of the founder members of a Birdwatching

group, and remembers venturing out with them even when there were substantial amounts of snow on the ground. The number of birds visiting the feeders on the balcony of her apartment is testimony to her interest in this activity. In addition, Marie fondly remembers holidays to Egypt, Italy and Paris with SU3A – holidays that would have been impossible without the organisation provided by U3A.

All of those I spoke to have fond memories of SU3A – the activities and new skills learned, the friends made, the fun had, and memories of different times – the small numbers, the typewritten and duplicated *LINKS* newsletter. Frank describes the SU3A of the 1990s as ‘a kitchen sink operation’, but here I must disagree with him. The numbers and the technology may have changed, but the enduring values of SU3A remain. These pioneers laid the foundations from which we all benefit today, and significantly, although their memories are of the past, none of them lives in the past.

I deliberately asked each of them if they thought the SU3A of the 1990s was better than today – they all answered with a resounding NO! All could see the benefits of a larger organisation which constantly renews and refreshes itself with new members, which embraces modern technology and which continues to provide new and expanding leisure and learning opportunities for the retired population of Sheffield. The commitment and effort of Frank, Yvonne, Betty and Marie made SU3A what it is today. Let us respect their legacy and continue their work.

It's Membership Renewal Time Again!

If you are on email, then by the start of December, you should receive a renewal reminder email from **Wild Apricot**. If you do not, check your spam first and then email **wa-adminsu3a.org.uk** if it's not there.

Last year over 50% of you renewed online. This year we hope it will be at least 60%. Any problems there were with the system have been ironed out, so if you ever use your credit/debit card online, **please** use it to renew your membership. Using the system considerably eases the load on our Membership Secretary and Treasurer. You can use either a credit/debit card or your PayPal account, if you have one, to pay.

Wild Apricot is fully encrypted (note the <https://> at the start of the web address). Wild Apricot holds no one's financial details, only invoices and a statement that these have been paid. All payments are handled by the PayPal bank and so are protected by the highest possible levels of security.

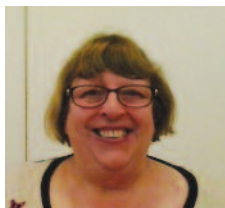

If you have changed your email address during the year or have any other problems with the system email **wa-adminsu3a.org.uk** and we will do our best to help. During the main renewal period we promise a response within 48 hours; usually it is much less.

If you prefer face-to-face help, members of the Wild Apricot Team will be at the December and January Drop-Ins.

Sheffield Hallam University Research

Nicola Dimelow, a PhD researcher at Sheffield Hallam University, is inviting members, age 60 plus, to participate in research investigating emotion perception in older adults. A number of tasks will be undertaken. Some will be presented on a computer where the participant needs to use a response box to indicate their choice from the given options. Other tasks will include the participant selecting the meaning of a series of words, completing a pattern, a memory task and filling in questionnaires about social activities, demographic information and emotion. Full information will be provided prior to consenting to participate. The study is expected to take approximately 2 hours, including refreshment breaks.

Elgar's adagio, written in 1914 anticipates the tragedy of war. George Butterworth died in the trenches in 1916 and his music captures the immensity of youthful loss. Vaughan Williams' symphony was written during the turbulence of the interwar years.

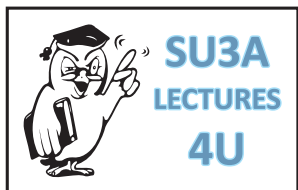

‘Can You ‘Ear Me, Mother’*

When you come to a U3A event, can you always hear the speaker?

Do you decide not to attend sometimes because you might miss much of the talk? Do you know that hearing loss is the third most common health problem in old age and one third of adults, aged 60 – 70, rising to 60% between the ages of 70 and 80 are affected?

This issue was raised at the AGM with an appeal for organisers to be more sensitive to using venues equipped with loop systems – and above all – making sure they are working and switched on. How many people don’t even join groups such as the U3A and become socially isolated which can lead to depression and possible dementia through lack of stimulation.

How easy do you find it to let others know that you are struggling to listen to their conversation, particularly in a crowded room? How empathetic can you be when your hearing is good but you realise that the person you are talking to is only getting half the story.

Deafness is a hidden disability and not as obvious as that of the wheelchair user who can’t get up the stairs. Many of us will suffer from it at a later stage of our lives – so let’s try to do the most we can to ensure that consideration is given to the suitability of every venue used. In this time of cutbacks in services, both NHS and local authority, let us try to share any advice or help with others in a similar predicament.

A Spanish Starter Supported Self-learning Group

This 8 session, rapid beginners' course in Spanish has the aim of taking you from not speaking any Spanish to being able to hold a simple conversation with native Spanish speakers in eight 2-hour sessions. It was developed by motivational management speakers in Swansea U3A as a rapid beginners' Italian course. I have been leading the Intermediate Spanish group at Ilkley U3A for the last 5 years and have converted it into this "SSS" course.

There are four pre-requisites for would-be SSS course participants:

1. Time and ability to attend (possibly share-host) the eight sessions and do the 15-20 minutes per day homework between sessions. Access to a printer might be helpful.
2. To be sufficiently adept with the internet to communicate with the leader by email, use the Youtube video examples, the Spanish/English dictionary and websites required in the course.
3. Accept that the mind does not need to translate from the primary language to a second language. It is capable of using a second language without the need for translation. The second language can be used to teach/learn the second language.

The History of Berlin and Dresden 10-16 October 2016



We are pleased to offer a 7 day/6 night holiday exploring the History of **Berlin** and **Dresden**.

A wonderful opportunity to appreciate the magnificent buildings, the history of some of its citizens and enjoy the splendour of the palaces and the surrounding scenery.

From our designated pick up points in Sheffield we will fly direct from Liverpool to **Berlin**.

Over the next two days we will enjoy a guided tour of the city; visit the **Jewish Museum Berlin** with free time to take an optional audio tour of the exhibitions covering two millennia of German Jewish history. We will take a guided tour of the internationally renowned ancient history museum, **Pergamon Museum**, which contains the huge Altar of Zeus from Pergamon (2nd century BC) and the famous Ishtar Gate from Babylon. Another must is time to enjoy an included “**Kaffee** and **Kuchen**” break in the Reichstag.

From Berlin we will make our way to Dresden, stopping at Potsdam, a town set amongst woodlands and palaces, including the **Sanssouci Palace** created in 1744 by Frederick the Great as his summer residence and the **Cecilienhof Palace**, the venue of the Potsdam Conference between the allies in 1945.

Our time in **Dresden** will include a guided walking tour of the city.



We will enjoy an included nostalgic one way narrow gauge steam railway journey from Radebeul to Moritzburg before visiting **Moritzburg Castle**; the famous Baroque hunting and pleasure castle of Augustus the Strong which dates back to the early 18th Century. We will also visit **Pillnitz Castle** and Gardens

which lies on the banks of the River Elbe, with its flying buttresses and ornamented chimneys; the only Chinese style castle of its size in Europe. Also included is a paddle steamer cruise along the River Elbe to Pirna to view the splendour of the Saxony Alps.

On our final day, flight times permitting, we will visit the **Meissen Porcelain Museum** before making our way back to Berlin Airport for our flight back to Manchester Airport and onward coach travel back to our original pick up points in Sheffield.

We will be staying 3 nights at the 4* Golden Tulip Hamburg Hotel in Berlin and 3 nights at the 4* Maritim Hotel in Dresden. All rooms are en suite and feature television, telephone, hair dryer and a mini bar. There will be a set 3 course dinner (excluding drinks) on the first and third night at each hotel, giving travellers the opportunity to independently explore local restaurants for one evening in both Berlin and Dresden.

The cost of this holiday is **£1145.00pp** with a single supplement of **£109.00pp** and includes; all travel by coach and air from and back to our designated pick up points in Sheffield, 1 x 20kg checked baggage and seat reservation, private executive coach travel during our holiday in Berlin and Dresden, audio headsets on days 2 and 6, 4 nights half board and 2 nights bed & breakfast, all entrance fees outside of those you may visit during free time and tips and gratuities (except for at the hotels which is left to the individual's discretion).

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**Travel Group Visit to Lincoln Castle
and Belton House, Grantham
Wednesday 13 April 2016**



Set high on a hill, Lincoln Castle has reopened following a four-year £22 million transformation. Built almost 1000 years ago by William the Conqueror, the castle has witnessed some of the most dramatic events in English history. It has been a symbol of power and punishment through the ages and a place where kings and

convicts have walked. The castle is also home to an original 1215 copy of Magna Carta, the document that changed the course of history. All will be revealed on our guided tour. We will have time to explore the towers and dungeons of the Norman castle and enjoy spectacular views over the city.

After lunch, (included) at the castle, we will travel to Belton House, a National Trust property. Belton is often cited as being the perfect example of an English country house. Begun by Sir John Brownlow in 1685, it boasts one of the most important silver collections in the country and the second largest library held by the National Trust. There is a café and a restaurant for refreshments.

The cost for the day is £40.70 and £29 for National Trust members. This includes coach travel, gratuities, coffee, admission to the castle, a guided tour and a light lunch. Admission at Belton for non NT members is also included.

Northumberland
7 – 11 June 2016**

Newcastle-upon-Tyne will be our base for this holiday. This area offers many interesting places to visit and a rich history to appreciate. On our way northwards, we will visit Nunnington Hall (NT), a 17th century manor house with many features which include the Carlisle collection of miniature rooms and an attractive garden stretching down to the river Rye. There is a café for snacks or a light lunch.



The itinerary will include a visit to Alnwick Garden, Lindisfarne Priory and Seaton Delaval Hall, which has been rescued from ruin by public donation and the National Trust.

Tom Keating, a Blue Badge Guide, who has been with us a number of times, will be taking us around the area.

On the first day we will go to part of Hadrian's Wall to see Vindolanda and Chesters Roman Fort and he will tell us about the many Roman artefacts and the latest excavations. After that, we will continue to Hexham, with its famous abbey and the oldest gaol in the country.

The next day we will go with Tom to the Woodhorn Museum, a former 19th century coal mine and now an award winning museum and Heritage Centre for art and local historical relics. It houses the work of the Pitmen Painters made famous by a play at the Lyceum and Robson Green in a documentary. We return to Newcastle for a guided tour of the city. On the journey home a visit is planned to a coastal town for lunch.

The cost for this **4 night/5 day** break is **£385** per person with a single supplement of **£65**. We are staying at the Holiday Inn Newcastle. It has all the usual facilities and a heated swimming pool.
