### From the Chair

We do not ask you for much money, £10.00 per year is less than many other U3As and certainly less than other organisations, but we do ask for a small amount of your time!

Perhaps you do not feel that you have the skills to help. Do not worry, there are many jobs to be done such as helping at Drop-Ins. There are jobs from making tea to chatting to new members, all of which need new volunteers. We are considering a Volunteers' Charter whereby members sign up to be a volunteer and we promise not to call on them more than three or four times a year. Surely that is not too difficult to promise? We are also aware that commitments to family, holidays and health play a part at our age, so nothing is compulsory. It is not easy asking for help. If we do not get people coming forward, then we will close eventually. The volunteers we have are tired. They have served their time and often have no-one in the wings waiting to step up and take over. So, as you are enjoying your next U3A event or outing, give a thought and decide to contact us to offer a few hours of your time. It is fun. It must be, or none of us would do it.

# Volunteers needed for a study of language and ageing

Healthy volunteers from any educational background are needed to participate in a study which investigates how language skills change as people age.

Participants will be asked to complete a series of new linguistic tests.

The information collected from this research study will be beneficial for establishing normative performance on new language tests and help to better understand the difference between patterns of deficits typical of normal ageing and those disrupted by disease, for example Alzheimer's disease.

Your participation will consist of two sessions, each lasting approximately half an hour and can be arranged at your convenience.

This study has ethical approval from the University of Sheffield Medical School Ethics committee.



#### Watch Out! The MOOCs are about

The world of online learning has been developing at a great pace. The latest innovation is *MOOCs*. MOOC stands for Massive Open Online Course.

MOOCs are high quality, multimedia courses produced by leading universities around the world, delivered to the desktop via a browser – and they are completely free. They cover a wide range of subjects from poetry to quantum mechanics and dinosaurs to philosophy and range in length from a couple of weeks to several months. The first MOOC ran in 2012 and was expected to have 2,000 students. It had 156,000. One provider in the US now has over 5 million students around the world on 535 courses from 107 partners in 12 different languages.

The main providers have been edX and Coursera in the US but now the UK is launching its own project, FutureLearn, as part of the Open University.



Most of the courses for FutureLearn will start in the new year but some are being tested now and U3A members are already helping with this.

Sheffield University is involved in FutureLearn and they are planning a MOOC called *The Country House* to be written by Professor Jim Fitzmaurice. This will launch in spring 2014.

The course will be based on houses in the Yorkshire region and SU3A has offered to help. It is likely that volunteers will be needed to try the course before it is officially launched so if you think you would enjoy helping with this project then email the editor at links sheffieldu3a.org.uk to register your interest.



#### **Passages Theatre Group**

This Group has really taken off this year and has produced a number of successful performances.

Under the direction of Sheffield University PhD student Bridie Moore months of practice and rehearsal have been turned into a varied programme of performances.

The Group is part of a Shared Learning Project whereby U3A participates in a research project proposed by another institution, in this case Sheffield University, to produce a piece of innovative and original research to the benefit of both U3A members and to the wider community.

The outcome so far has been the theatre production 'LIFE ACTS' which explores the experience of ageing through improvisations based on the experiences and ideas of group members.

Part of the enjoyment of the group consists in experimenting with various ideas and seeing if they work through rehearsal. Amongst successful improvisations have been dramatic representations of first memories, age discrimination, exploring attitudes to ageing and examining hopes and fears about ageing. The group has also developed musical improvisations to accompany various scenarios.



The major performance so far took place at the University Drama Studio before a capacity audience. Two performances were also held in Sheffield Winter Garden where the group was relieved to find the performance went down well before an uninvited and mobile audience looking for sandwiches and coffees during their lunch breaks. Typical audience reactions have included: 'focused and confident performances of personal material'; 'made me feel more positive about ageing as the cast themselves showed there is still so much you can accomplish'; 'the music was captivating in mood'; 'a deeply moving performance'.

Approximately 20 members attend on a regular basis and vary in experience from absolute novices to those with experience of performing. One of the strong features of the group has been its mutually supportive nature – all members have developed trust and confidence in each other and everyone feels that they have grown as performers as a result.

The project is on-going and new members are very welcome to come and see if membership might suit them.

The Group meets every Thursday at 10.00 at the Rehearsal Studio 1 in Shearwood Road (off Glossop Road).

#### **Report:**

#### Literature Network: Gabriel Garcia Márquez

On October 30 Dr Pascale Baker from the Department of Hispanic Studies, Sheffield University, gave an excellent talk at the Quaker Meeting House on the Nobel Prize winning Columbian author Gabriel Garcia Márquez.



Dr Baker concentrated on the two best known works of this author, '100 Years of Solitude' and 'Love in the Time of Cholera'. Both novels are famous for using the powerful literary device of 'magical realism' where things happen in the narrative which cannot be real but which seem perfectly acceptable to the characters in the story, even though it is clear the novel is not meant to be a fantasy. This form was especially developed in '100 Years'.

In using this device Márquez suggests that, in the real world, we delude ourselves when we unthinkingly take myth for reality.

The penalties for this self-delusion can be severe. Márquez has been especially concerned about the imperialist domination of South America by Europe and North America and, as he sees it, the myth that this is universally to the benefit of the South Americans. Although Márquez has not been a political activist he has publicly supported Fidel Castro in Cuba as a political alternative to American regional dominance.

The lecture was well attended and was followed by 15 minutes of informed questions and discussion showing that the audience appreciated and understood the contribution Márquez has made to literature.

Pascale Baker's talk was much enjoyed by the audience.

## **FOCUS ON** Discussion (Group One)

## **Travel Group Visit to Bletchley Park**

#### Wednesday 12 March 2014

Following the huge interest in our trip to Bletchley in October, we have arranged a repeat visit in March 2014.

We tour the famous wartime code-breaking centre of Bletchley Park where the most secret German military coded messages were received and deciphered. This information was vital in planning the Normandy landings in 1944 and in winning the Battle of the Atlantic.

We visit the buildings and rooms in which the work was done. We view captured German Enigma and Lorenz coding machines and Alan Turing's Bombe decoder. We see the later Colossus electronic computer at work. We experience the cramped working conditions of the code breakers and share the excitement of their discoveries. Security was so good that the German High Command never realised that their codes had been compromised.

The cost is £32.00 per person. This includes travel and gratuities, a sandwich lunch, a guided tour and afternoon tea. You will be able to view wartime memorabilia including the private Churchill collection.

#### Travel Group Holiday to Glasgow and surrounding area

#### 5-10 June 2014

Our short break in June will be based in Glasgow, advertised as 'Scotland with style'! In 1990 Glasgow was named European Capital of culture and today remains a major centre for the arts.



We will follow the trail of the legacy left by Art Nouveau Pioneer and father of the 'Glasgow Style', the artist and architect Charles Rennie Mackintosh. But it is not all art; beyond the city there are places telling the fascinating history throughout the region.

On our way to Scotland we will spend some time in Carlisle where we will be able to have lunch and have a look around the city. Mackintosh for the publisher Blackie.

Another day will be spent at the David Livingstone Centre, the birthplace museum of the life and work of the famous Scottish explorer, followed by

a breath-taking boat journey on the amazing Falkirk Wheel rising 35 metres from one level to another on the Union Canal. On the last morning, before going home, we are going to see the Burrell Collection in Glasgow's Pollock Park. This unique art collection has an astonishing range of beautiful objects and major works of art from around the world.

Accommodation is at the 4 star Glynhill Hotel in Renfrew a few miles away from the city centre. All bedrooms are en-suite with the usual facilities and there are a swimming pool and a leisure centre.

## Appreciating Architecture Group: Visit to Woolsthorpe Manor and Burghley House, September 2013

These houses were built within a hundred years of one another and are so very different.

Woolsthorpe Manor, a yeoman's farmstead, was built around 1600, simple from the outside but the interior showed it had been lived in by a prosperous land owner. This is the house where the young Isaac Newton lived and on the plaster walls were the remains of his scientific scribblings. It was too wet to sit beneath the apple tree although the fruits were ready to fall. Instead we stretched our mathematical and scientific knowledge by spending longer in the Science Discovery Centre.

The young Isaac, driven from Cambridge by the onset of the plague, returned home to work. It was here he described this time as being at the prime of his age, most notably his work on light and optics as well as his law on universal gravitation. It was a fun time for those of us who tried out some of his experiments. With much laughter we endeavoured to work out his theories, helped by an excellent guide. To think he had to make his own equipment lenses and mirrors before he could prove anything.

We were amazed at the genius of the man.

Burghley House tested our historical and art knowledge. Built for Sir William Cecil in the late 16<sup>th</sup> Century, the architecture is a stunning example of the Elizabethan age with fine examples of the stonemason's craft with the many towers, cupolas and disguised chimney pieces in the baroque style.

The interior did not disappoint with elegant rooms and fine furniture. The painted ceilings by Laguerre and Verrio were stunning even if the Hell Room was daunting and the family portraits by the leading artists of the time were very fine indeed. We admired the fine marquetry furniture, the elaborate plaster ceilings, wood carvings by Grinling Gibbons and the embroidery on the bed hangings. We were indeed glad that we did not have to dust any of it.

Thank you Shirley for another lovely trip. We had excellent guides and learnt so much.
