We have had a visit from Jean Goodeve, the Chair of the Third Age Trust (TAT - the umbrella body to which U3As are affiliated and from where you receive your *U3A News*). Our submission to the White Paper on Adult Education has led to much closer links with

Government departments and other agencies. It is clear that adult education has a chronic funding disorder and that the disease may be incurable. People intent on passive engagement in WEA-style courses may be expecting U3As to offer a cheap alternative, which of course we do not!

The new Yorkshire and Humber Regional (YAHR) Body has been duly inaugurated and congratulations go to our own John Richards and David Rance, who have been elected as Chair and Committee member respectively. The main purpose of YAHR is to serve as a conduit between TAT and the steadily growing number of individual U3As - 731 at the last count. It is hoped that it will also forge links with the Open University at regional level. Regional summer schools may become a regular feature.

Your Committee has also been working on ways of encouraging greater member involvement in the running of SU3A; has simplified the way in which it handles proposals for Gift Aid expenditure; and is considering the feasibility of an open lecture series starting in 2010.

The advance planning for the Silver Jubilee in 2011 has started. The first key date for your diary is 30 June – we are hiring the whole of Wortley Hall for an all-day celebration. Coaches will be on hand to ferry members back and forth in comfort. There can be walks, strolls, local history, music, arts and crafts, Scrabble in Latin.... come rain or come shine, the possibilities for Group activities are endless. There will also be plenty of different attractions. Current ideas include an antiques road-show, treasure hunt, wine-tasting and possibly even a little light opera. This is one event that can bring us ALL together in celebration of our great organisation – and SU3A members, their friends and families will all be welcome. And if you would be willing to help with the planning of this big event, I would LOVE to hear from you!

#### **Visit to Torrs Hydro Electric Scheme**

The Sustainable Development Group has arranged a visit to Torrs Hydro Electric scheme on **Sunday 25 October 2009**, departing central Sheffield at 9.30 am. We have hired a minibus and the cost will be £10 per head. The hydro electric scheme is at Torr Weir on the River Goyt in New Mills in the High Peak. It is run as an Industrial and Provident Society and was registered specifically so that the community could own the scheme. The founding directors of this, the first community funded hydro electric scheme in the UK, are all local people.

Our interest is in understanding the process, as something similar is being proposed for Sheffield. *Sheffield Renewables* is a social enterprise formed by a group of local volunteers who are working to develop renewable energy projects across the city, for the benefit of the city and those living and working here. Their first hydro power scheme is likely to be located on one of the historic sites which have been used to power Sheffield in the past, e.g. Kelham Island.

## Saltaire and the Bradford Industrial Museum

#### Thursday 8 October 2009

Our October visit takes us to one of the best known industrial sites in Yorkshire, the model village of Saltaire. This was built in the 19<sup>th</sup> century by Sir Titus Salt, a wealthy mill owner and public benefactor, to house his workers in conditions far ahead of the times. Today, Saltaire is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. His Woollen Mill now contains an art gallery, dedicated to one of the country's largest collections of paintings by the local artist David Hockney, together with shops and restaurants.

We have organised morning coffee in the historic United Reformed Church and a walking tour of the village, led by local guides in Victorian costume. There will be time to explore the village further, see the mill and visit the Victorian Hall with its Museum of Reed Organs and Harmoniums. Lunch is not included, but there is an excellent restaurant in the Mill, with a full range of snacks and meals. In the afternoon we have arranged a visit to the Bradford Industrial Museum, where we have included tea and biscuits before our return to Sheffield.

### **Spring in Northumberland**

### **New Bathrooms for Old**

Lab4Living is a research team at Sheffield Hallam University. For several years SU3A has enjoyed a connection with designers at their premises at Psalter Lane and now continues to help at their Furnival Building in the city centre. Earlier in 2009 many of you agreed to help with the Future Bathroom project, which continues for another two years. Already some have been visited at home; and a group gathered one winter morning at the Lab4Living centre to discuss problems encountered in the bathroom caused by aging and increasing disabilities.

More recently, a follow up meeting was held at the Furnival Building to assess progress made in the last few months. There were various user groups, as well as people from industry. Denise West and I represented SU3A. The researchers provided a presentation explaining some of the concepts involved in designing a Future Bathroom. The bathroom remains a vital part of our home, it affects everyone's lives. It may be a pleasurable place to dream and relax the hours away until the water is cold, or it may be a dreaded experience involving climbing, banging and groping around or, worse still, total imprisonment.

The Future Bathroom project involves users telling researchers their problems, in a way becoming researchers themselves. Changing your bathroom can be an expensive experience, but if we purchase knowing that needs change as we age, flexibility in choice is a key to wise planning. There are major outlets such as B&Q, or maybe Asda, who may help us to choose fresh makeovers; or we may prefer to consult a shop specialising in items for the disabled. One of the ideas we explored at Lab4Living was a bathroom in which furnishings could be moved around - the mobile loo, the detachable hand basin, the movable bath. Another thought was the use of handsets, not to switch on the television, but to turn on and off the bathwater. Technical problems, we were assured, could be overcome by skilful engineering. What was paramount were the needs of the user. And things needed to be fun and affordable. [continued on page 34]
