What is Happening to Fairness in Britain? By Danny Dorling

Professor of Human Geography, University of Sheffield.

What is happening to our country? Why does unfairness prevail and are we yet bankrupt or not? Danny Dorling attempts some answers, looking across to other countries, back to the history of Britain and forward to what many people say they wish society to be. He also discusses some of the lesser known facts of life in Britain.

Danny Dorling has a world-wide reputation for his work on mapping the changing social, political and medical geographies of Britain and further afield, concentrating on social and spatial inequalities to life chances and how these may be narrowed.

In 2008 Danny was appointed Honorary President of the Society of Cartographers. In 2009 he was awarded the Gold Award of the

Geographical Association and the Back Award of the Royal

Geographical Society for his work on National and International public policy.

In 2008/9 he was a member of the Academic Reference Group

advising Ministers on the Social Mobility White Paper. In 2009 he

joined the World Health Organization's Scientific Resource Group

on Health Equity Analysis and Research. With colleagues he has
published over 25 books and 400 papers.

INSURANCE COVER FOR YOUR GROUP

Lately, cases have arisen where some of our Groups, often for very understandable reasons, have "mixed membership" I mean by that members of a SU3A Activity Group enjoying their activity alongside other distinct individuals who join in the activities but who are members of a different organisation (eg, a SU3A Activity Group is set up to play badminton; the Coordinator finds it convenient to join up and share expenses with, say, a local church badminton club).

I have sought advice from our U3A "legal-eagles" in London and we are warned that the insurance protection given universally to U3A Activity Groups in the UK is dependent on these Activity Groups being composed exclusively of U3A members. The committee would be grateful if you would carefully examine your own Group's situation in the light of this restriction.

The situation becomes potentially disastrous if there are non-U3A members in your Activity Group.

Today's World Group The Big Society on the Rocks?

This is not to question whether one of the Government's major policy ideas is now on the rocks. In the U3A we do not discuss such things, but the titles of the two most recent discussions at the Today's World Group do make for an amusing juxtaposition.

In March the subject of The Big Society was introduced for us by Gordon Doole who chose to start by quoting the American political philosopher Michael Sandel who suggests that "there is a strong feeling amongst the majority that there is space in society not occupied by the Government or the Markets where individuals join together to promote the Common Good. These non-governmental and not-for-profit organisations are of great value to society".

Gordon reviewed for us how nations, societies and other organisations have tried to develop systems which achieve an acceptable balance between our individual freedom, our acceptance of common law and compliance with a government to enforce them.

In his fascinating talk he touched upon Thomas Hobbes, the Civil War, Hegel and Marx and much more (including Tony Blair and David Cameron) as he stimulated us to think about the shape of the society we would like to live in.

Then, at our April meeting, the meaning of the mysterious title "Rocks Ahead" became clear when John Richards talked to us about the problems associated with the World's growing population. A series of staggering statistics (a population of 8 million in England in 1800 compared with 52 million today and an anticipated 65 million in 2050) was balanced by a review of how population has been regulated historically and the views and warnings of famous thinkers. The rocks ahead soon became very clear to us.

Another first-class talk served to educate us, give us much scope for discussion and also to send some of us home feeling very depressed!

Visiting the History Lace Making

In March, Daphne Marshall and her friend Susan Williams presented to the Visiting History Group an interesting afternoon on the history of hand-made lace, together with an excellent exhibition and demonstration.

Pillow lace requires the aid of a pillow or pad into which pins are pressed in a pattern which will form the design. Threads, made from the fibres of the flax plant, are contained on separate small bobbins and then twisted or plaited around the pins and each other. Lace making was introduced into England by the Huguenots (French Protestants) seeking refuge from religious persecution at the end of the 16th century.

They settled in Southern England, establishing Honiton, in Devon, as one of the thriving centres. This increased the family income and the women often contributed more than the men. In the 17th century the first mechanical process was introduced and in 1813 John Leavers, a Nottinghamshire mechanic, laid the foundations of the modern lace manufacturing industry. As a result the cottage industry went into decline.



In 1841 Edward, eldest son of Queen Victoria, was christened in a Honiton lace gown, which is still worn at all Royal Christenings, and Princess Diana's wedding veil was handmade in Honiton. Literature Network

The Literature Network held its first meeting of 2011 on 12 April at Shirley House when Dr Wendy Michallat of Sheffield University's French Department gave a talk about Madeleine Blaess to a capacity audience.

Madeleine Blaess was, for much of her career, a lecturer in the same department at Sheffield, taking up an appointment as a specialist in Medieval French in October 1948 and remaining at the University until her retirement in 1983.

Dr Michallat's focus, however, was not so much on Madeleine Blaess' links with Sheffield as on her earlier life which is documented in private papers and memorabilia which she left to the University.

Born in June 1918 to French parents, Madeleine was brought up in York, and later attended the University of Leeds, graduating in 1939 with a First Class degree in French. Eager to pursue her academic education, she enrolled that autumn at the University of Paris and the Ecole des Hautes Etudes. This proved a momentous decision. Having "missed the

last boat home", in January 1940, Madeleine had to stay in Paris for the duration of the war, only returning to the UK in 1945. Throughout this time she kept a diary which, today, provides fascinating insights into life under the German occupation. "All I have done is battled hard to survive, to not die of starvation and exhaustion", Madeleine wrote wryly of her wartime experiences.

Yet, in gifting her personal papers to Sheffield University, she has left an invaluable legacy. It is through accounts such as hers that we can engage with the immediacy of lives lived at such times.

Dr Michallat supplemented extracts from the diary with a number of contemporaneous photographs, the interior of Madeleine's small

room the view from her window, the round-ups and deportations that she witnessed.

Altogether this was a fascinating talk, providing an introduction to one of Sheffield University's hidden gems. *Anon*


Classical Concertgoers' Group Sunday 7 August


