Vera Dyer: a happy Ceilidh goer

The World War II Project or

"Would you like a bomb?"

Without doubt the above question is the oddest I have ever been asked and definitely not what I expected when I agreed to help out with this project.

Back in 2009, a small group of members with war-time experience was interviewed by students at a local school and, at the same time, the Sheffield U3A Executive Committee was looking for a shared project to mark our Silver Jubilee in 2011. Around the same time, talk turned to the passing of Harry Patch, the last surviving veteran of the First World War, and it was realised that we are now reaching a stage where fewer and fewer people are left who lived through the Second World War. For the benefit of future generations it was felt vital to record their stories now.

The result was that one member, Peter Hughes, advertised in the *Links* magazine and organised a meeting of interested parties. Peter had the vision of producing a book, and also a display of photos and memorabilia, at Wortley Hall on the Jubilee Day, 30 June 2011. Some people wrote their own memories whilst others preferred to be interviewed and have their stories typed up. A small group of people began work and at some stage I was invited to join them.

The first person we lost was Denise West when she became Vice-Chair (and now Chair), and sadly Peter had to pull out of the project late in 2010 due to ill-health leaving Dot Sutcliffe and myself to soldier on. Happily we were joined by Helen Collingwood, who became our IT specialist, getting the book ready for the printer.

Meeting people and hearing their stories was undoubtedly the most enjoyable part of the project. We were all so impressed by the ordinariness with which people talked about traumatic events in their lives and by the variety of material received. The book is a real mixture of stories and experiences ranging from the Sheffield Blitz, the experience of Londoners, evacuation, life in the armed forces, Holocaust survivors and those brought up in enemy countries during the war. Some were very young children at the time, and the Letts Schoolboy Diaries kept by one member gave us a vivid picture of wartime life seen through the eyes of a boy of 13 or 14. The hard work was editing the stories and putting them together in an attractive, readable format but eventually 'Lest we Forget'-SU3A memories of the second world war was printed and published in time for the Silver Jubilee Day at Wortley Hall.

Back to the question about the bomb. This was in connection with the display of memorabilia at Wortley Hall. It was a question I responded to with extreme caution, and it was ultimately a relief to find that the bomb was not forthcoming, I didn't want to be responsible for blowing up Wortley Hall!

All who saw the display will have enjoyed the great variety of exhibits which brought back memories for many, and having people on duty on the stand who could talk with knowledge about the gas masks, tin hats and other items, added to the interest. We were surprised to receive an ATS jacket and an RAF flying jacket in good condition, but perhaps the most moving exhibit was a striped jacket worn in Auschwitz concentration camp. This left a lasting impression on all who saw it.

The great stories about the Second World War have already been told – this one illustrates how ordinary people (each in their unique way), coped with and survived extraordinary experiences.

Environmental Studies Group: Energy Survey

During the Jubilee Celebrations of June at Wortley Hall, the Environmental Studies Group carried out a survey about saving money on energy and some other environmental aspects. 104 people completed our fairly straightforward questionnaire and we are grateful to them for giving of their time to us.

The overall results show that members of Sheffield U3A are aware of the need to care for our environment – and thereby save money.

Virtually all respondents had low energy light bulbs, insulated lofts, stopped taps dripping, turned down the central heating below 23°C.

We found that Public transport in some places is virtually non-existent.

People living in flats had problems with some questions. Often they did not know about insulation, water metering or energy efficient refrigerators and were not sure they could answer a straight yes. They showed awareness of the issue raised and so were counted as a yes.

Some of the respondents lacked wall insulation in their homes despite government grants being available. Some respondents were not aware of the heat loss through windows or the benefit of reducing central heating systems below 23°C.

Two questions about refrigerators caused problems. If a fridge automatically defrosts itself could you put 'Yes' against the question: "Is your fridge regularly defrosted"?

Also people were not sure of the energy efficiency of their fridge. This is not the sort of information you normally carry around with you.

The overall result does illustrate that members of Sheffield U3A are environmentally aware and take appropriate action.

We would love to see more of you at our Group meetings.

Capesthorne Hall, near Macclesfield, is a Jacobean–style hall with a collection of fine art, marble sculptures, furniture and tapestries. Originally designed by the Smiths of Warwick, it was built between 1719 and 1732. It was altered by Blore in 1837 and partially rebuilt by Salvin in 1861 following a disastrous fire. The present squire is William Bromley-Davenport, Lord Lieutenant of Cheshire, whose ancestors have owned the estate since Domesday times.

This is an opportunity to visit the hall during the normally closed winter period. We will see how a family-owned stately home is decorated for the festive season. Local musicians, bell ringers and school choirs will entertain us during our walk around the house and in the basement there will be an opportunity to visit various craft stalls. The Butler's Pantry will be open for tea or coffee and refreshments such as hot meat rolls, soup, mulled wine and mince pies. On the last day, before returning home, we will visit the Slimbridge Wetland Centre which was founded by the late naturalist Sir Peter Scott. It is the birthplace of modern conservation, saving wetlands for wildlife and people across the world.

We will be staying at the 4-star Ramada Bristol City hotel which enjoys a central location near the waterfront and is convenient for sightseeing. All bedrooms are en-suite with the usual facilities and lifts to all floors. There is also a Leisure Centre.

York Mystery Plays

Matineé Performance Saturday August 4 2012

There is no record of the first performance of the plays but in 1376 they were part of a religious celebration in York. The plays were organised, financed, and often performed, by the York Craft Guilds. "Mystery" is a play on words, representing both a religious truth or rite, and, in its Middle-English meaning, a trade or craft.

The cycle of plays comprises some 48 pageants which were originally presented on carts and wagons. The decorated "Pageant Wagons" would be paraded through York stopping at each of the playing stations designated by the City banners. Traditionally an individual Guild would take responsibility for a particular play - for example the Barkers (tanners of animal hides) acted out the Bible story of the Creation, and the Bakers the story of The Last Supper.

The stories were told in the everyday speech and dialect of medieval York. After their suppression in Tudor times the plays remained little known until a production in 1909. Then, in 1951, Festival of Britain year, the York Festival of Arts put on an extremely successful performance in the ruins of St. Mary's Abbey.

In the interest of comprehensibility an abbreviated and modernised text is now used which does not spoil the essential content of the drama. Since then, the plays have been presented every three or four years with well respected actors taking the main parts supported by very talented local amateurs. A major production is planned for 2012 and will be staged in a bespoke 1400 seat theatre to be built around the superb setting of the Abbey ruins in the Museum Gardens. (Continued on Page 36)
