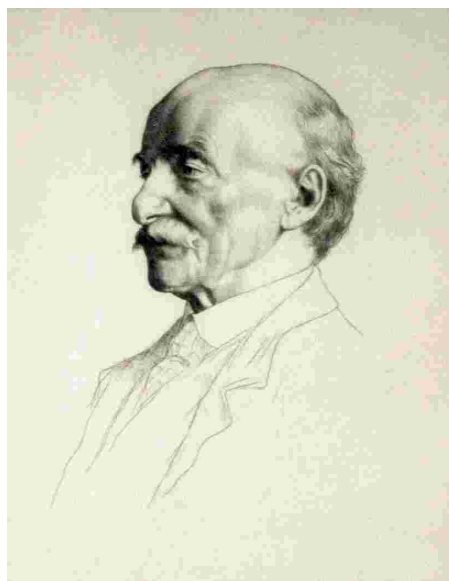

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

By the time you read this, no doubt the advertised places in existing groups will have been snapped up; the new ICT group already promises to be oversubscribed before it starts and the formation of Book Group II is an example of the many groups that have grown out of the original one – some to the extent of three or four times. Our latest meeting was on 1 September, when we were sorry to note the absence of Beryl Moore, our Minutes Secretary, who has served the committee very competently in this capacity for many years. You will have seen her many times at AGMs. However she has now decided to take a well-deserved retirement. At present our Secretary, Barbara Steel, has taken this job on, as well as her own duties. Everyone's sincere thanks to them both.

The visualiser, recently purchased for U3A groups' use, following a suggestion from a member at the AMM, is now available, and its performance pronounced 'marvellous'. John Brooke, Equipment Officer, is thanked for his help in setting this up. Could your group benefit from using this new piece of kit? We have also decided that a small copier would be of great assistance to the Secretary and have authorised the purchase of a reliable model.

Sheffield U3A membership continues to increase and has now reached 2162, up 139 on last year. The updating of the database for the Membership Secretary, essential for the efficient handling of this number, is under way, and is being tailored to current requirements.

Links Editor, Myra Smith, has made enquiries about colour pictures in the magazine, but as this would involve special paper, and all the pictures being in the centrefold of the magazine, we have decided against it at present.

Finally, the four members going to the National U3A Conference at Chester discussed with the rest of the Committee the proposals for the structural changes in U3A national organisation, which were described in U3A News Summer 2006. Time permitting I hope to report elsewhere in *Links* the preliminary recommendations for change arrived at in Chester.

U3A NATIONAL CONFERENCE AND AGM

2-5 September 2006

Jean Goodeve and Stan Miller, retiring joint vice-chairmen, stood for election as Chairman. Jean Goodeve was elected, and Stan Miller continues as one of the two vice-chairmen. John Leiper (Wooler U3A) was confirmed unopposed as representative for the North East Area.

Terry Hardie, Hon. Treasurer, presented the accounts and gave (for me) a very clear explanation of all the figures. Suffice it to say here that U3A remains in the black and there is to be no increase in the capitation fee this year.

U3A receives no government funding and there is a decrease in external grant support. Terry Hardie recommended the Friends of U3A scheme to all who want to support our movement by an annual donation.

Organised into small groups, all those attending Conference discussed the proposals for changes in U3A structures, and there were some very lively exchanges of opinion. At the report back stage it was emphasised that nothing has been decided in advance and that the way forward will be through further consultation with the members. The general thrust was that whilst the delegates were not antipathetic to the suggested changes, all detailed proposals will require careful scrutiny.

This is an important step in U3A history and your Committee asks that you should think about the proposals and let them have your ideas as soon as possible. The issues to be addressed, and the proposed changes in structure, are set out in the current edition of U3A News (Summer 2006; pp 20-22).

2007 will mark the 25th Anniversary of the foundation of U3A, and next year's Conference is to take place on a cruise ship, the MV Athena, departing from Falmouth on 15 September 2007, the AGM itself being on land after the ship returns to Falmouth.

VISUAL DISPLAY EQUIPMENT

We have now acquired a 'visualiser' which, when linked to a projector (which we already have), will function like an old fashioned epidiascope. In other words, it will project onto a screen whatever material you put on its work surface - a picture, map, diagram or whatever, including small objects like flowers or insects. It lacks the sophisticated facilities of PowerPoint, but has the advantages that no technical knowledge is required and you do not have to prepare material beforehand. Also you can zoom in or out. Thus, for example, at an art group meeting you could project whatever works of art you wanted from books that members brought along on the day and zoom in to examine an artist's brush strokes.

Ring me on (0114) 255 2905 if you want to book the equipment in advance. I can quickly and easily show you how to use it when you collect it.

We also have two new screens - one very nice small model (103 cm wide x 75 cm high) for domestic use, which is easy to use. The other one is of conventional design (121 cm square).

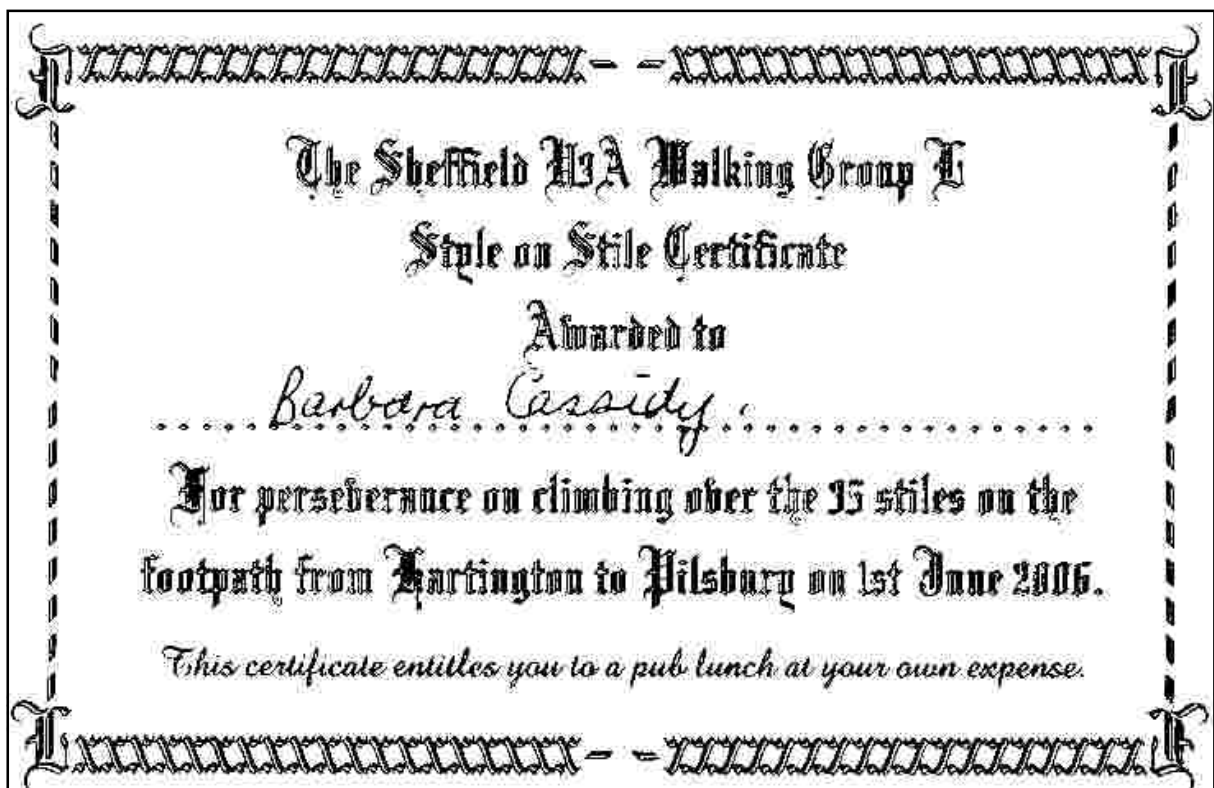

Holiday Insurance

In no circumstances will the Sheffield University of the Third Age be responsible for covering claims for loss of life, personal injury, medical expenses, accidents, loss or damage of luggage or personal property, cancellations or loss of deposits. Each person must themselves insure against these risks.

Group Insurance

From January 2007 **NO** Group Insurance will be arranged by SU3A Travel organisers. Each individual member will be responsible for arranging their own fully comprehensive Insurance.

Only members of Sheffield U3A can join the tours/day trips.

Difficulties

Our trips and tours contain a full range of activities and need to be considered carefully by individual applicants. Some people have difficulty getting on and off coaches, and our excursions demand a degree of active involvement and physical independence. Organisers, fellow passengers, and drivers cannot be responsible if such issues have not been considered. If in any doubt, please consult the Organiser before applying.

Refunds cannot be given for cancellations unless a replacement can be found.

In the case of a cancellation please contact the day trip or holiday organiser or another member of the Travel Group Committee as soon as possible.

Please contact the Organiser if you are unable to be at your pick-up point, or want to change it.

Please do not park in front of the doctor's surgery on Millhouses Lane.

Galleries of Justice, Nottingham Tuesday 14 November 2006

There has been a court here since 1375 and a prison since at least 1449. It ceased to be a court of law in the 1980s and now law abiding citizens (and some felons) are invited to experience a “trial” in the Victorian courtroom. We will take part in the trial of three suffragettes before visiting the cells and prison yard accompanied by gaolers and prisoners from the past. The three suffragettes are charged with inciting a riot after their peaceful protest got out of hand. Found guilty, were they made an example of because of their beliefs, or did they get a fair trial? Will the jury be sympathetic to their cause, or treat them as a threat to society?

The cost is £19.00 per person. This includes the coach, driver’s tip and entrance ticket. Meals and drinks are not included. Hot and cold drinks are available on site, but there is no café. However, a room is set aside for us to eat our own packed lunches. As our visit is from 10.00am until 3.30pm, it would not be sensible to go in search of cafés off-site.

Derby and the Royal Crown Derby Factory Tuesday 5 December 2006

Join us for a pre-Christmas visit to one of our most celebrated pottery manufacturers. We have booked a full guided factory tour, which includes demonstrations of the various processes, from the initial design to the decorations and final stages of manufacture. After the tour, you will be able to see the visitor centre, museum and the factory shop. Coffee on arrival and a light lunch at the end of the visit have been arranged.

Afterwards, we go by coach to the city centre, where there will

be time to choose other activities – perhaps visit the Cathedral, the Pickfords House Museum, the Museum of Industry and History, the Central Museum and Art Gallery, or explore the markets and shops and enjoy the Christmas atmosphere of Derby, before returning home in the late afternoon.

Rome, Sorrento & Amalfi Coast 21 March—1 April 2007

Flying from East Midlands Airport. Staying three nights in a 3* centrally positioned hotel in Rome. Tours of Rome included, taking in the major sites of this exciting city. First day bed, breakfast and evening meal, the other two days on bed and breakfast only. En-route we will stop off at Montecassino.

We will spend eight nights in a 4* hotel in Sorrento on the Amalfi coast which said to be one of the most spectacular coastlines in the world. Tours included are the Amalfi coast, Mount Vesuvius and Pompeii, Herculaneum, Villa Oplontis, Naples and the geysers and boiling mud at Solfatara Volcano. There are three free days - one maybe on the Isle of Capri?

The cost is £1035 (excluding group discount) which includes coach to the airport, driver's tip, coach throughout in Italy, most gratuities, tours mentioned, BB/HB in Rome and HB in Sorrento. The single supplement is £199.

We will stay four nights on half board at the 3* Quality Hotel Snowdonia in Llanberis at the foot of Mount Snowdon. The hotel is very conveniently situated for us to explore the spectacular scenery and interesting venues in the area. We will be visiting Port Merion, Beaumaris, Plas Newydd, Electric Mountain, Welsh Slate Museum and Caenarfon and riding the Ffestiniog Railway. On our way to Wales we break the journey in Llangollen for a horse-drawn barge ride on the famous canal, then on to the hotel in time for dinner. On our way back to Sheffield we will visit Bodnant Gardens to see the magnificent laburnum arch, which should be in full flower at this time of the year.
