Janet Gough was introduced as the new Minutes Secretary (photo right).

The Chairman, Joan Keogh, reported on a meeting with the Sheffield North U3A, but had to report that it had now been wound up.

The Treasurer reminded all Groups that a copy of their accounts must now be sent to him, but many were still outstanding. He also reported that 2,300 members were currently enrolled, yet



another increase on the same period last year. He thanked Michael Brumby, the Independent Examiner of our accounts, and John Brooke, Equipment Officer, for their excellent service over the last year. Norman Smith, Web Coordinator, reported that only 26 out of our 138 Groups had so far established their own group home page on the website. He hoped many more would do so soon (please contact him for assistance).

# **Requests for Voluntary Help**

## How does the Brain Control Speaking?

A research study is investigating the regions of the brain that control speaking. The team, led by Dr Barbara Rosario, are seeking volunteers to attend a 90 minute session at the Royal Hallamshire Hospital. Volunteers should have no history of neurological illness (e.g. stroke, epilepsy, head injury), be strongly right handed and a native speaker of English.

The study uses transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS), using electro-magnetic pulses to stimulate the brain. TMS is safe and non-invasive (i.e. does not involve anaesthetics or surgery). You will be recorded as you say words and sentences. Some volunteers will be invited to attend for an MRI brain scan after the speech study.

# **HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE AGM/AMM**

The Annual Members' Meeting at Tapton Hall on 27 April was attended by 92 members. A number of groups put on displays of their work, including Art groups, Patch and Quilt, and Woodworking/carving. The level of expertise was amazing and it was fascinating to watch a work being produced.





In her Annual Report the Chairman, Joan Keogh, said that there had been steady progress through the year, and that there are now more than 130 groups together with open groups covering travel, literature, music, theatre as

well as quiz nights. She specially thanked Notre Dame school for hosting our ICT group. SU3A now also has links with both

universities in Sheffield, helping with their research. Joan thanked the Committee members for their work over the year as well as the behind the scenes workers, especially the Enquiries Officer, the Membership Secretary, the Equipment Officer and the *Links* stuffers for their support.



Five members of the Committee are standing down and five new members (photo on page 3) have come forward to replace them.

The Chairman noted that SU3A has now received  $\pounds$ 5,000 in Gift Aid and will receive  $\pounds$ 3,000 a year for the forseeable future.

The Gift Aid working party has produced an initial report suggesting areas where Gift Aid might be used, including support for group activities, keeping members in touch, purchase of one-off items, promoting SU3A in parts of Sheffield where it is not well represented at the moment and financial support for other activities.

## **Literature Network - The Rise of the Novel**

Dr Karen Morton, from the Institute of Lifelong Learning led an exhilarating canter through the origins of the novel. Until the written word began to be more generally available with the advent of printing in the 1500s, most people relied upon the oral tradition to supply information and entertainment, as well as religious and moral instruction. Many of the plots which still appear in novels - rivalry, love and courtship, adventure, war and murder, the doings of the rich and powerful - can be found in ballads and romances.

The 18th century saw the emergence of printed work which

began to approach the definition we might apply to the novel today "a long prose narrative about largely fictional if usually realistic characters and plausible events" (John Richetti), though realism and plausibility were often not a priority! Dr Morton told us that Richardson's *Pamela*, the early novel recounting the preservation of a maidservant's chastity, served a variety of purposes. While the tale claims to illustrate the rewards of virtue's triumph, Pamela's pursuit mildly titillates the reader, at the same time as (apparently its original intention) instructing the aspiring in the art of letter writing!



Dr Morton has herself researched a neglected 18th century novelist, Eliza Parsons, and attenders were busily making notes of unfamiliar authors as well as exchanging opinions with the speaker. The spread of literacy, and motivation towards self-improvement to fulfil social and financial ambitions, gave a huge impetus to the rise of the novel, which blossomed in the 19th century with the classics known to us all.

Literature Network talks are open to all SU3A members, so if you have an interest in discussion about drama, poetry or novels, please look out for our twice-yearly events and come along. The Literature Network meets again in the autumn watch this space for further details.

#### **Travel Organising Committee**

#### Only members of Sheffield U3A can join the tours/day trips.

**Holiday Insurance -** In no circumstances will the Sheffield University of the Third Age be responsible for covering claims for loss of life, personal injury, medical expenses, accidents, loss or damage of luggage or personal property, cancellations or loss of deposits. Each person must themselves insure against these risks.

**Disabilities -** The policy of Sheffield U3A with regard to taking members on trips is to be as fully inclusive as possible. However, our trips and tours contain a full range of activities and need to be considered carefully by individual applicants. The organiser must, therefore, be advised of any health issues or disabilities at the time of booking. This enables the organiser to discuss with the Tour Operator/Travel Agent or the place of interest on a day trip, as applicable, to assess the suitability of the trip for the member, who can then make an informed decision.

Whilst every effort will be made to accommodate a disabled person on all social trips, if there is a conflict of opinion for Short Breaks and Holidays the Tour Operator/Travel Agent will make the final decision.

**Cancellations -** In the case of a cancellation please contact the day trip or holiday organiser or another member of the Travel Group Committee as soon as possible. **Refunds** cannot be given for cancellations unless a replacement can be found.

Please contact the Organiser if you are unable to be at your pick-up point, or want to change it. **Please** do not park in front of the doctor's surgery on Millhouses Lane. When sending a **stamped addressed envelope** it should be no less than 4 x 8 inches, with the new correct postage for its size.

## Highlights of Hampshire 3 -7 September 2007

For this short break we will be staying at the Chichester Park Hotel, which is well placed for our interesting itinerary. On the journey to Chichester we will visit Chartwell, home of Sir Winston Churchill, and on our way home again at the end of the holiday we will visit Hughenden Manor, where Benjamin Disraeli lived. These two places are National Trust properties, so are free of charge to NT members.

During our stay at Chichester we will have daily excursions to venues including Winchester Cathedral and Library, Brighton Pavilion with a "behind the scenes" tour, Fishbourne Roman Palace and the Weald and Downland Open Air Museum. We shall have a day at Portsmouth Historic Dockyard where our all-inclusive tickets allow access to HMS Victory, the Mary Rose and HMS Warrior (the world's first iron-hulled armed warship) as well as the many fascinating exhibits on the site.

The cost per person for this five day holiday is £338 (plus single supplement of £85), excluding insurance. #### **Rome and Sorrento March 2007**

This was a 12 day holiday that took us some 3,000 air miles, 400 miles by coach in Italy, and often many hundreds, sometimes thousands of years into Italy's past.

We stayed in the centre of Rome for three days, imagining listening to the roars of the bloodthirsty crowds in the Colosseum; or seeing Michelangelo on his back painting the

roof of the Sistine Chapel; maybe observing the throng along the Forum debating the latest news and edicts from the Senate. This is what our minds did. Our feet (plus coach and quide) took

us to the

Colosseum, the Pantheon, the People's Square, the Trevi Fountain, the Arch of Titus leading to the Forum and, of course, to the Vatican Museum and St. Peter's Basilica. Leaving Rome we knew we could never adequately describe the beauty and wonder of what we had seen so suffice to say, if you haven't been, then do make every effort to spend at least three days in Rome.

En route to Sorrento, we stopped to visit the town and monastery of Montecassino. This area saw WWII's most hardfought struggle. It lasted six months, cost 250,000 lives and completely destroyed the magnificent monastery. We were pleased to see the restoration, bringing it back to its former glory. We arrived in Sorrento to enjoy four star treatment at our hotel. At the start of our planned itinerary, we were joined by our local guide, Eugenio (aka Pavarotti), whose knowledge of, and enthusiasm for, the area and its history was second to none. The first tour was

along the fabulous Amalfi coast with its stunning views and buildings perched precariously on rocky cliffs; another day to Pompeii and Vesuvius where in 79 AD the latter buried the former in volcanic ash for archaeologists to uncover some 1600 years later. What they discovered was truly amazing, which we didn't appreciate to the fullest extent until we visited

the National Archaeological Museum in Naples. Visits to Herculaneum and Oplontis allowed us to see better preserved sites. Villa Poppea in Oplontis was Nero's home built for his wife Poppea.

After our tour of Naples, we visited the "flat" volcano of Solfatara. On leaving the coach we were hit by the "rotten egg" smell of sulphur. Walking on the site we could see the ground smoking and it was hot to the touch. Our guide called for silence and then lobbed a fair sized rock into the air. When it hit the ground it made a sound like a bass drum. We were standing on a skin of earth some 25 feet thick, capping a reservoir of gas!
