Why do people give up playing music?

I am currently working as a research assistant at Sheffield University's Music department with Dr. Stephanie Pitts who has been awarded an AHRC Cultural Value grant to explore themes of '*Dropping in and dropping out: investigating partial and lapsed arts engagement*'. This work asks challenging questions about why people stop attending concerts or belonging to amateur ensembles and whether there is a potential crossover of audience loyalty from one art form to another.

Cruising on the Canal

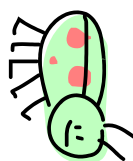
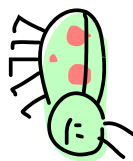
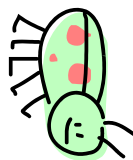
Sunday 13 April 2014

George Orwell: from Realism to Dystopia

Professor Chris Hopkins, Sheffield Hallam University

Chris Hopkins is Professor of English Studies and Head of the Humanities Research Centre at Sheffield Hallam University where he teaches and researches twentieth-century literature, especially works published between 1930 and 1945.

He has published *Thinking About Texts - an Introduction to English Studies* (Palgrave, 2001, revised second edition 2009) and *English Fiction of the 1930s: Language, Genre and History* (Continuum Books, 2006). He is currently working on a book on Walter Greenwood's *Love on the Dole*.

Report: Lesotho Trip

The idea for the venture came about following an inspirational talk to the SU3A by Mr Ken Dunn of the charity Africa's Gift.

He described the wonderful work being done by young volunteers at the Malealea Development Trust in Lesotho, Southern Africa and following the talk considerable interest was expressed in the idea of U3A members becoming involved. Following further meetings with Ken twelve of us, predominantly SU3A members, signed up to help with the Trust. As mature individuals we thought we could bring a different range of experiences which might be useful. We were a mixed group with backgrounds in medical, academic, engineering, technical and other skills. The party would be led by Ken and accompanied by a doctor, Hannah, and a South African based guide, Tim.

The Sheffield group left for Cape Town in early November meeting up with Tim and the doctor there.

Before travelling to Lesotho we spent some time in the beautiful city of Cape Town and its surroundings.

Whilst there we did the usual tourist visits to Kirstenbosch World Heritage site, the Cape of Good Hope (seeing the penguins on the way), Table Mountain and of course Robben Island.

At the prison, now a museum, in which Mandela spent some eighteen of his twenty seven years' incarceration, we were most privileged to be shown around by the chief guide, a one-time prisoner himself and a personal friend of Nelson. We were taken into Mandela's cell, something tourists are not normally allowed to do.

We all felt this to be a most moving experience and hearing our guide's experiences illustrated the greatness of Mandela.

A few days later we began our travel towards Lesotho by flying to Bloemfontein in the Orange Free State from where we made the long road journey to the Lesotho border, that county being entirely landlocked by South Africa.

On the journey we stopped off at Bethulie, a small town in Boer War country. A local historian took us around many of the sites including an old concentration camp set up by the British!

We were invited to the home of a retired concert pianist who gave us a wonderful recital in his living room.



This was much appreciated.

We eventually crossed into the Mountain Kingdom of Lesotho, one of the world's poorest but most beautiful countries. Metalled roads soon gave way to dirt tracks as we approached the Malealea valley through a pass which has been described as 'The Gates of Paradise'.



In summary the Malealea Development Trust works hand in hand with the Malealea community on a range of educational, socio-economic and environmental programmes. Together they promote empowerment, improved livelihoods and a spirit of independence. We hoped we could

contribute to these aims. The Trust is based in a century-old trading station now converted to an award winning lodge and is an integral part of

Projects we were involved with included: the development of a community farm where we planted fruit and nitrogen fixing trees and illustrated the importance of enriching the soil, the demonstration of clean burn stoves and thermal cookers called wonder bags or magic ovens! These are similar to hay boxes but are made from cloth and polystyrene. Both the stoves and the wonder bags help reduce premature deaths from smoke inhalation. They also use far less fuel-wood hence freeing the women who spend much of their time collecting firewood.

Some of our group spent time skill-sharing with a local women's sewing group and repairing old Singer machines. Plans are well underway now for this group to start making the wonder bags in the community!



Our medical colleagues did a splendid job engaged with village health workers and made up simple medical kits from supplies which we took with us. They also participated in some training for the workers and this work will continue via ongoing dialogue and electronic materials. Other activities included undertaking surveys on health and stove usage and we made visits to local schools where in one case we had about 200 children out on the field doing the hokey cokey to much amusement.

Fortunately there was also time for wonderful treks to local beauty spots including a spectacular high waterfall. To aid the village economy we always employed local young people to act as guides and interpreters. Responsible tourism and experiences such as this are very powerful indeed and truly involve giving and receiving! Future groups will carry on the development work under the guidance of the Malealea Trust!

On the completion of our work in Malealea we travelled overland via the capital Maseru back into South Africa and made our way up toward Johannesburg taking in the famous Cradle of Humankind World Heritage Museum and the wonderful wildlife in Pilanesberg National Park.

I believe that I and my fellow travellers returned home having given of ourselves but we were also recipients of that true sense of shared humanity - Africa's Gift!

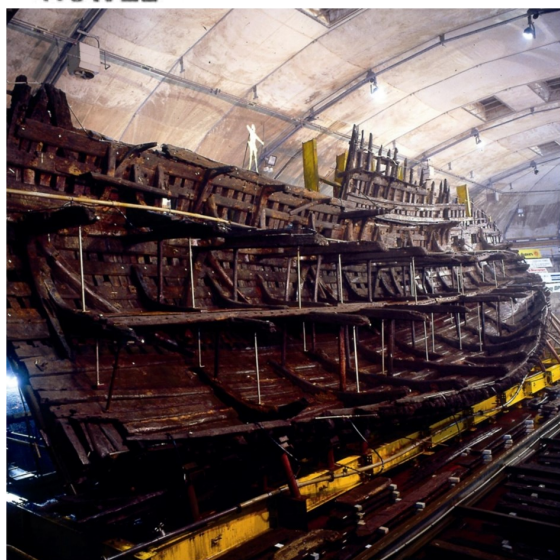

The following day we travel to Portsmouth to see the new Mary Rose Museum and the historic dockyard.



The Museum is purpose-built to preserve and display this irreplaceable piece of British history. There are 19,000 artefacts from the wreck. A boat trip is included in our visit.

On Tuesday we visit Gilbert White's house and garden. He was one of the fathers of natural history and his book 'The Natural History and Antiquities of Selborne' has never been out of print since it was published in 1789. There is also the moving story of Captain

Lawrence Oates' memorable journey to the South Pole with Scott.

We return to Chichester for lunch and free time to explore this ancient city. The Cathedral has windows by Marc Chagall and an altar cloth by John Piper.

Wednesday morning we travel to Brighton where a visit to the Pavilion with audio guides is included. We then go to Arundel Castle. This magnificent castle was destroyed by Cromwell and largely rebuilt in the 18th century. It has retained a 13th century barbican. We can also see 15th century furniture and paintings by Gainsborough, Van Dyck and Reynolds.

On Thursday we leave Chichester for home. On the way we visit Hughenden Manor (National Trust), home of Benjamin Disraeli for 40 years. This comfortable Victorian house still holds many of Disraeli's pictures, books and furniture. Lunch will be available in the café.

For this 4 night/5day break at the Chichester Park Hotel, the cost per person is **£340.00**, with a single supplement of **£67.00**. The hotel has the usual facilities and an indoor pool. The price includes bed, breakfast, evening meal, coach travel, gratuities and all admission fees except for the two National Trust properties. Lunches and snacks are not included.

Wentworth Woodhouse is one of the finest and grandest Georgian Houses in England. A formidable mansion, it was one of the most expensive ever built.

The current house was built by the first Marquis of Rockingham and incorporated part of an earlier manor house, built c. 1630.

In the 18th century considerable external alterations and adaptations were made to the house. Intriguingly, the façades of the west and east fronts were completed by different architects. The east front is sober, precise, stark Palladianism, with its political associations with Whig architecture. It is also the longest façade of any English country house. In contrast, the slightly earlier west front was built in Baroque style.

Over the years, the house has seen enormous changes as well as being used as a College of Physical Education. Finally, since 1999, Mr Clifford Newbold and his family have owned and maintained the buildings and landscape.

We will have a guided tour to see approximately 15 rooms of the restored mansion and our guides will tell you more about the family and their fortunes.

After the tour, we will have lunch at the Wentworth Garden Centre. You can then visit its historic garden and browse in the Garden Centre and the shops. Refreshments will be available in the afternoon.
