U3a Day - from Public Relations Adviser Helen Leech

Hopefully the word is out and everyone is aware that the 2nd June is u3a day. The aim of the day is to raise the profile of the u3a and the hope is for it to be a platform to gain national as well as local media attention. It's also hoped that the day will influence those providing services for older people and challenge negative perceptions of older adults. Whatever the situation with Covid, it is planned that the event will take place this year, however it's probably wise to plan for both physical and virtual activity. It would be brilliant to aim to have hundreds of eye catching events across the region. National u3a has a multitude of tools to help in planning the day and have also been providing support sessions. The next session is on 2nd March and can be booked on the website <u>www.u3a.org.uk/events/u3a-day</u> The dedicated u3a day Facebook group can also be joined from this link. From April merchandise will be launched from the brand centre and templates for press releases and marketing materials will be available to customise as desired.

There are many ideas being considered, from "have a go" activity tasters spread across a variety of town / city outdoor venues, to member parades, music performances, treasure hunts and flash mobs. A choreographed flash mob routine is possibly being planned by national, in order to be performed by u3as across the country. We can practise it in advance from our living rooms as we continue to stay at home! And in terms of online events there is no shortage of ideas, from desert island discs to lectures and quizzes, with the idea of inviting non- members to join in.

Invite key local organisations and individuals, eg local press and radio, council leaders, Mayors, representatives from organisations such as Age UK and other voluntary sector organisations working alongside older people, Clinical Commissioning groups, Adult and Community Services, Adult Education and more.

Whatever your u3a plans to deliver, aim to get the word out as soon as possible to ensure that the date is saved. Let's make this a wonderful day to remember and to share with others who are currently unaware of the hundreds of activities the u3a has on offer.

SUMMER EVENTS

Summer School

It had been hoped to run the Summer School, postponed from 2020, this year, but because of the uncertainties around the restrictions which may still be in place, in particular social distancing for indoor gatherings, and the need for advance planning at the venue, it has been decided to cancel this year's event. We hope that we will be able to run the event in 2022.

Captain Cook Event

At present this event has not been cancelled, and is currently scheduled for June $22^{nd} - 24^{th}$. It is expected that the museums will be open, and according to the most recent information all restrictions will be lifted by June 21^{st} , though there is some uncertainty about this. If restrictions are still in place we may seek to hold the event later in the year, possibly September. Further information will be given in the next Newsletter and also posted on the website.

Workshops

Our first "virtual" Workshop was held on zoom on 8th February on the topic of Social Media, led by Jean Jackson of Lichfield u3a. The following questions were discussed. How can we seize the opportunity to promote and run u3a online? What is social media, what is of most use to us, and how is it changing? This talk used recent 2020 data and analysis to suggest what we might think about and what we can do.

Details of our next zoom workshop are as follows.

We are delighted to be able to welcome **Ian McCannah**, our national u3a Chair, to the Yorkshire and the Humber region at **10.30 on Thursday 11th March 2021** to an open forum meeting to be held via Zoom. This will be an opportunity to share and discuss issues and ideas and to ask him about the future direction of our u3a in these very difficult times.

Across the region there are many examples of u3as that are keeping very active, embracing new technology and offering varied programmes for their members. Many are also already making plans for when regulations change and we can resume more normal ways of meeting, accepting that things will probably have to be different from a year ago.

We will aim to share examples of good practice and discuss some of the projects being developed in the region.
